### THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

Nominations Took Place Yesterday for the Vacant Seats.

TORONTO, Dec. 2.—The nominations for the vacancies in the Ontario Legislature took place yesterday.

In Halton, J. R. Barber, Liberal, and W. Kerus, Conservative, were nominated; and in West Huron, Hon. J. T. Gannon, Liberal, and Mayor Beck, Conservative, were nominated.

McDiarmid, the Conservative member for West Elgin, resigned yesterday. His seat had been protested.

Plot Against Ferdinand.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Special despatches from Buda Pest, published here yesterday, say that a plot to assassinate Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria has been discovered at Sofia. It is added that numerous arrests have been made. Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria, the youngest son of the late Prince Augustus of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, and Princess Clementine of Bourbonnais-Orleans, daughter of King Louis Philippe, was born February 26th 1861, and was elected Prince of Bulgaria by unanimous vote of the National Assembly, July 7th, 1887.

More Trouble in Africa.

BRUSSELS, Dec 1.—The Soir says that trouble has arisen in Africa between Germany and the Congo Free State relative to the respective boundaries of German territory and Congo territory, north of Lake Tanganyika. It is added by the Soir that a strong force of Germans has been sent to the Makumba country, while the Congo forces at Lake Kivu have been considerably reinforced.

Austria-Hungary.

VIENNA, Dec 1.—The Neue Freie Presse yesterday announced that Baron Banffy, the Hungarian premier, has agreed upon a provisional Ausgleich, with a prolongation of the status quo. The Ausgleich is the agreement between Austria and Hungary under which the cost of the administration of the common affairs in the Austro-Hungarian dual monarchy, is borne by both, in a proportion agreed to from time to time.

Spain and the Carolines.

MADRID, Dec 1.—The Imparcial announces that the Government intends to retain the Caroline, and will only sell them in case it receives an advantageous offer and they become a burden to Spain. The paper adds: "The Government has not received such a proposition, but expects to do so."

Another Election Trial.

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—East Wellington Conservatives have filed the promised petition against the return of Hon. J. M. Gibson, elected in the recent contest for that constituency.

Gordon Memorial.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—General Lord Herbert Kitchener, the Egyptian Sirdar, in an open letter to the morning papers today, appeals to the British public to subscribe £100,000 to found and maintain the Gordon Memorial College at Khartoum, with a view of educating the Soudanese and continuing the work which General Gordon commenced. He says the Queen and the Prince of Wales have consented to become patrons of the undertaking, and that Lord Salisbury has written him, supporting the scheme as "the only policy by which England's civilizing mission can be effectively accomplished." Lord Kitchener announces also that Baroness Burdett-Coutts and other people of wealth and high position support the enterprise. At a banquet tendered him at Edinburgh last evening, Lord Kitchener, in responding to a toast to his health, explained his plans for the institution at Khartoum, and made a dramatic appeal for funds. He also asked for help from the "people of the great English-speaking sister nation of America." The Earl of Rosebery, who was at the banquet, eloquently and patriotically endorsed the project.

### The Cuban Tariff.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The Cuban tariff will be issued in a day or two. It will be based upon the old Spanish tariffs, and modified with some reference to the Dingley law. This tariff will apply equally against ourselves and the rest of the world. It is an open door. If the Teller resolution is maintained, this tariff is likely to be of more importance than any other of colonial affairs. It will apply to the island presumably until complete civil government is again established, and when that time comes, unless we annex the island, somebody else will make the tariff. If we keep faith, this will be our last Cuban tariff.

Kaiser to Write Up His Tour.

BERLIN, Dec 1.—Emperor William, it is rumored, intends to write for publication an account of his Palestine tour. The Bismarck memoirs have not created much of a sensation.

### EPISCOPAL MISSION.

The Bible reading by the Bishop of Nova Scotia in St. Paul's yesterday afternoon, at 4 p. m., was largely attended. The subject was the chastisement of God. Many were much helped by the better understanding of a fact in life which is so dark to the world.

Twenty persons belonging to the Caravan were killed, and eighty camel-loads of feathers and 380 loads of Soudan skins were lost.
