LAB FIRM PLEASED

Land-Bred Cattle Used In Experiment

A Toronto firm is "exceptionally well pleased" with results they have achieved with five bred gilts and one boar they bought here this summer for use in a hybridization experiment at Colville Road. It was learned here yesterday afternoon by John Kelly, director of veterinary services for the province.

The John Crawley who is with the Commonwealth Research Laboratories told Dr. Kelly recently that he had purchased 200 lbs. of feed of the offspring, and the number of pigs weaned per litter by the five gilts and Stanley the young boar.

The program pursued at Colville Road is aimed at developing the SPF (Specific Pathogen Free) program which uses pure bred parents in a hybridization or cross-bred program for commercial breeders. They are the only ones in Canada doing this so far as Dr. Kelly knows though others are using the SPF program in pure bred animals (Pathogen is bacteria or virus that produces disease).

By taking the litters from the dams by caesarian section, he can eliminate Atrophic Rhinitis and Virus pneumonia which are the two major diseases that limit the profit on a large-scale commercial operation. The idea is to put on the market highly bred sows and boars whose offspring will be used for commercial operation. The aim is to produce pigs with a more efficient rate of gain possible for each pound of feed, and a carcass that rates high in quality. Dr. Kelly said.

LESS FEED
The laboratory people claim that a 40-pound SPF pig, for example, will reach market weight in close to 200 pounds less of feed than the ordinary commercial pig. But it is difficult to tell with exactness, Dr. Kelly explained, because they use an unusually high energy food in their operations.

The Coughton people looked over quite a number of pig barns in the province before they selected the Colville stock, Dr. Kelly said, and Dr. Crawley has promised to send the provincial veterinary director the results of individual tests to produce the program to their quality care.
