The Stock Farm Buildings.

In the search for jobs, rings, corruption and rascality generally, the Patriot is just now exceedingly zealous. It denounces the public works being carried on with the undoubting assurance of one who might be supposed to know something about them, and with the wild vehemence and scurrility of a disappointed contractor who failed to bulldoze the Government into making him their tool.

Canadian vs. English Weather.

REV. MR. BRAY, of Montreal, is in England. He lectured the other evening to a number of fellow-Englishmen; and concerning that most important point, the weather, this is what he said:—

"The general opinion seems to be that it is a land of snow and ice—that all the year round, except for a few weeks in August, we go about in furs or blankets in a constant state of alarm, and fear, and dread of being frost-bitten. I do not wonder that such a notion is prevalent, and Canadians themselves are usually responsible for it. The truth is that they are proud of their winter, and when they get photographs of themselves or of any other kind of scenery they judge worth looking at, they get it in winter dress, and so Canada is supposed by the people here to be another Siberia, and not a desirable place to live in. That is a great mistake. I have lived in Canada five years, and have not heard during that time, one-twentieth part of the grumbling against the weather I have heard in England in say one year. I know of no climate that is so good as the Canadian. The winter is cold; the thermometer will often register twenty and thirty degrees below zero, but we suffer far away less from cold than you would do in England. For one thing we dress ourselves and build our houses to meet the weather, and then the air is so dry and crisp that we scarcely feel the cold at all. I can do more work in Canada than I could do in England, for the air is bracing, and not depressing, as it so often is here, when it hangs heavy and damp with fogs."

Exhibition Notes.

HENRY LONGWORTH, Esq., and Charles C. Gardner, Esq., have been appointed by the Local Government as Special Commissioners to represent this Province at the Dominion Exhibition at Halifax.

A Harbor in the Open Gulf.

Between the mouth of the Mississippi and Galveston, about 10 or 15 miles to the west of Sabine Pass is a place in the Gulf of Mexico, which is commonly called the "Oil Ponds" that ply in that locality.

Austria's Naval Resources.

The estimates of the Austrian army and navy for 1882 contain a large vote for new ironclads. The Government views with uneasiness the immense superiority of the Italian fleet over that of Austria, and regards it as an imperative duty to endeavour to make Austria a naval power.

The representatives of the St. John merchants who are interested in the establishment of a line of steamships between that port and Great Britain have purchased a vessel in England for that purpose.

Constantinople advices state that the exiled Pasha implicated in the death of Abdul Aziz has been transferred to a fortress near Medina, Arabia, and lodged in separate cells. All communication with them is prohibited.

Meeting of the Emperors.

It is said that the meeting of the Emperors at Dantzic was of the most affectionate character throughout. Both were evidently deeply moved. On board the Hohenzollern they kissed each other several times. The greeting between the Czar and the German Emperor was also most cordial.

The circumstances which preceded and led to the Dantzic interview are described by the correspondent of the New York Herald as follows:—Ever since Alexander III.'s accession to the throne the relations of the German and Russian courts had been growing less and less friendly, chiefly because of the extreme coldness with which the German princes were treated there.

My last anecdote refers to the Princess Louise of England, Lorne of Canada. There was a carnival procession to be seen when she was here, and the excellent lady and suite were to have witnessed it from the windows of the royal palace, but they started from the hotel too late, and the crowd was so dense that they could not reach their destination.

It is hoped that President Garfield's case will add one more name to the long list of illustrious men whose lives have been spared to the world when all hope seemed over. William of Orange-Nassau, the founder of the Dutch Republic, when shot through the face and neck by a Spanish assassin, recovered contrary to the expectation of both friends and enemies; Richard I., of England, survived the fever which seized him in Palestine, although his best physicians had pronounced his case hopeless; Sultan Baber, the Mogul conqueror of India in the 16th century, was at one time so reduced by sickness as to be unable to swallow anything but a few drops of water; the English King William III., though sickly from his very birth, was thrice given up by his doctors before the end came, and even then owed his death chiefly to the effects of a fall. A still more singular instance was that of the famous Italian statesman, Cardinal Bentivoglio, whose life was despaired of from quinsy. The servants and physicians, thinking him already dead, had quitted the sick chamber, and the universal silence enabled the Cardinal's pet monkey to issue from the nook in which it had hidden itself. Putting on its master's red hat, the animal began to admire itself in the mirror, grimacing and chattering so comically that the moribund Cardinal burst into a violent fit of laughter, which broke the quinsy and saved his life.

Personal.

SENATOR A. E. BURNSIDE died on the 13th from heart trouble, aged 51. He was a prominent General during the Rebellion.

MR. SANKEY, the evangelist, started from New York on a tour of the world on Saturday. Mr. Moody and himself begin preaching in England in the middle of October.

THE Quebec Chronicle publishes a supplement containing an excellent picture of the dashing young Minister of Militia, Hon. Adolphe Paillière Caron, M. P., of Quebec, as well as a biography of the same gentleman, and a full text of his admirable speech in reply to an address presented to him at Fimish, P. E. I., during his recent visit to that place in company with Sir Leonard Tilley.

MR. DUNCAN MCINTYRE, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was in Toronto the other day. In conversation with a representative of the Mail, Mr. McIntyre said that tracking across the prairie is proceeding at the rate of a mile and a half a day, and that he expects the railway will reach the Rocky mountains two years from now.

NEWS NOTES.

Frost is reported from Cheyenne, and a killing frost from Denver.

Australia continues to send frozen meat to London in good order. Canada ought to be able to compete in that trade.

The Windsor Cotton Factory Company is progressing. It has secured three or four acres of level ground close to the railway, and arranged for brick, etc.

Shocks of earthquake have occurred in various points in the Neapolitan provinces, and a few persons have been killed. Many were injured seriously, and great damage was done to property.

A Rome despatch says:—A gentleman, believed to be Herr Niemann, German Consul at Leghorn, while in the coupe on the railroad from Paris to Turin, was seriously wounded and thrown out of the window by an unknown man.

Madrid advices state that the feeling against France is running so high in consequence of the latter's refusal to indemnify the Spaniards of Oren that the Cabinet may be forced to recall its ambassador from Paris. The matter will lead to violent debates in the Cortes.

A Constantinople despatch says:—Much dissatisfaction is caused by the attitude of Russia towards the negotiations for the settlement of the Turkish debt. It is understood that Russia intends calling attention to the convention which prescribes that the Russian occupation of Bulgaria must be paid before the Bulgarian tribute is diverted to any other purpose.

An effort is being made in the United States to supply the thirteen million dollars worth of raw silk imported and used in American manufactures. The work is being mainly carried on by the Women's Silk Culture Association.
