THE SITUATION AT THE FRONT

BOERS CONTINUE TO HOVER AROUND BLOEMFONTEIN

British Concentrating for an Attack From Any Direction.

A VICTORY FOR METHUEN.

The Boers have been Largely Reinforced—French Still at Watervaal—Force of Boers Attacking Brabant's Column—Clements' Division Seventy Miles Beyond Bloemfontein—The Irish Guards—News of the Canalians—British Troops Captured.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

BOERS AROUND BLOEMFONTEIN.

LONDON, April 6.—The Boers continue to appear at various places around Lord Roberts' position at Bloemfontein, causing the British to concentrate so as to be ready to face an attack from any direction. The latest force to show itself on the scene of action is reported to be in the neighborhood of Karee Siding.

There is no doubt that the Boers have been largely reinforced. It is supposed by the Free Staters who only recently professed to yield and give up some of their firearms that the Boer movements in force strongly indicate their purpose to harass Lord Roberts in the hope of hampering any attempt to move northward. General French is still at Watervaal and an infantry brigade is holding Bushman's Kop at Springfontein.

General Gatacre is watching closely for possible attempts to cut the railway line.

A force of Boers has reached Wepener, forty-five miles south of Nchu, and is attacking General Brabant's column.

While the Boers are thus pushing southward, General Clements' division, comprising 6000 men, has moved steadily north and is now encamped 70 miles beyond Bloemfontein.

The fact that Lord Roberts has allowed him to go this far north conveys the impression that if the Boers have been in the neighborhood of Paardeberg they have since retired.

CAPE TOWN, April 6.—Dr. Jameson has arrived here. He is very ill.

IRISH GUARDS.

LONDON, April 6.—The army orders today contain the following: "The Queen having deemed it desirable to commemorate the bravery shown by the Irish regiments in the recent operations in South Africa has graciously been pleased to command that an Irish regiment of the Foot Guards, be formed under the designation of the Irish Guards.

NEWS OF THE CANADIANS.

BLOEMFONTEIN, April 3.—The Royal Canadians returned today with the rest of the brigade (General Smith-Dorrien's.) They went as far as Bushman's Kop, about 19 miles distant, where they camped on Sunday.

Four companies who had been doing escort duty to Watervaal Drift, retired yesterday to Springfield, some eight miles out. Today they returned to the old camp tents which arrived today from Belmont. They are a great boon, as the men have been sleeping in the open.

Private Forest of the Quebec Company died of enteric fever on Sunday last.

VICTORY FOR METHUEN.

LONDON, April 6.—Methuen telegraphs from Boshot, in the Orange Free State, a little northeast of Kimberley, as follows:

"Surrounded General Villebois Mariuil and a body of Boers today. None escaped. Villebois and seven Boers were killed and eight wounded. Fifty prisoners were taken.

BRITISH TROOPS CAPTURED.

LONDON, April 6.—Lord Roberts reports that five companies of British troops have been captured by the Boers near Bethany.
