

# Eden Has Backing Of Most British In Canal Dispute

LONDON (CP)—A newspaper poll, published Monday, indicates that Prime Minister Eden has the backing of the majority of the British people behind him in his handling of the Suez Canal dispute.

The Daily Express, a right-wing paper, says 49 per cent of a representative cross-section of voters expressed themselves as satisfied with the way Eden has handled the situation. Thirty-four per cent was "dissatisfied" and 17 per cent express no opinion.

The Express poll comes amid continuing conflict in British newspapers over the merits of government policy on Suez. A number of papers, headed by the Manchester Guardian, Independent and others, have been outspokenly critical, contending that Britain's attitude is too aggressive.

Others, such as The Daily Express, Daily Mail, Daily Telegraph and Sunday Times, all leaning to the right politically, have been stoutly supporting the government.

NO "SABRE" QUOTES

The Sunday Times, in a two-column review of events since the announcement July 26 that Egypt was nationalizing the Suez Canal, says British government policy has been based on two themes—that control of the waterway cannot be left in the hands of one man who has shown he is untrustworthy, and that Britain's cause is not isolated but international.

A main criticism of the government has been that some of its actions, including dispatch of troops to Cyprus, smack of "sabre-rattling." To this The Sun-

day Times replies that "no single occasion on which a government spokesman has rattled the sabre is ever quoted."

FEARS STILL ALIVE

Similarly, The Daily Telegraph expresses hope that Wednesday's debate on Suez in the British Parliament—recalled from recess—will not be obscured by "gabbling" about sabre-rattling.

"If military precautions had not been taken, then indeed we should have been guilty of empty bluff," says the paper.

But the Manchester Guardian maintains that the fears of war are still alive.

"The onus of proof lies on the prime minister," it says. "It is not enough to have peace and war at the mercy of a prime minister and his personal policy."

**Librarian Digs Up Indian Bones**

COURTENAY, B.C. (CP)—Bones, believed those of Indians who lived near this Vancouver Island community long ago, have been dug up by city work crews just south of Courtenay.

The bones were found in an ancient Indian midden about six feet wide and some 700 feet long. Also found were arrowheads, needles made of bone, and an axe head.

F. S. Graham, who lived near the place where the discovery was made, had earlier found a skull which had been pierced by an arrow.

Miss Laura Bateman, a librarian here, is digging in the area to determine how extensive the midden is and its age.

The relics have not yet been dated and it is not yet known to what tribe the Indians belonged.

## Plan New Aluminum Plant in New York

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)— Reynolds Metals Company announced Monday the acquisition of 1,500 acres of land near Massena, N.Y., for a proposed aluminum reduction plant.

A statement from the firm said the plant would have the advantages of large quantities of "firm power," a central location in the St. Lawrence River area for the shipment of aluminum to the east or west, and low-cost water transportation of raw materials.
