Yukon Contract in the Senate.

THREATS OF MINISTERS RESENTED.

Liberal Criticism of Liberals

MR. MARTIN WANTS MORE INFORMATION.

Second Reading of the Franchise Bill.

OTTAWA, March 23.—In the Senate, yesterday, Hon. Mr. Mills moved the second reading of the Yukon bill. He spoke at length, following the line of the addresses of the ministers in the House of Commons. He said that he thought the Senate should not interfere with measures adopted by the House of Commons relating to public expenditure and public domain. Mr. Kirchoffer, of Manitoba, led off in Opposition. He protested strongly against the threats made by the Ministers and the Government press that if the Senate did not pass the bill vengeance would be taken on the Senators. These threats were as futile as they were vindictive. The Senate had the independence and courage to deal with this matter on its merits. Senator Kirchoffer completed an able criticism of the contract and the House adjourned.

OTTAWA, March 23.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Charlton pitched into the Government for their hasty action in prohibiting the importation of United States nursery stock. A great loss had been inflicted on dealers, some of whom he declared have had a score of agents out all winter taking orders for the goods which parliament would not allow them to fill. The discussion continued most of the afternoon.

The Minister of Agriculture defended his own actions.

Mr. Martin, of P. E. Island, wants to know what the Government propose to do about dredging Wood Islands Harbor?

The second reading of the Franchise Bill was moved and the matter discussed.

FIRE IN AMHERST.

Rhodes & Curry's Car Works

AMHERST, March 22.—Fire destroyed the car works of Rhodes, Curry & Co. last night and did about fifty thousand dollars damages. The buildings destroyed are the moulding-shop, in which were the machine shop and foundry, all of which are destroyed together with the mill containing the carpenters' shop, planers and framing department and patterns and pattern shop, with a valuable lot of timber just stored. The loss is covered by insurance.

THE MAINE DISASTER

Report will be Sent to Congress on Monday

WASHINGTON, March 23.—The report of the Maine inquiry commission will not be sent to Congress before Monday next.

ALBANY, Mont., March 22.—The most severe snow storm of the season is prevailing in this section. The snow is drifted badly, and all trains are delayed and some will have to be abandoned entirely. The snow is even more severe in the mountains.

MADRID, March 22.—Lieut.-Commander Jose Sobral, formerly attaché of the Spanish embassy at Washington, was in conference with the Queen Regent yesterday.

MONTREAL, March 22.—The water is going down and the apprehension of a flood has nearly passed. The Hochelaga cotton mills were compelled to shut down on account of water extinguishing the fires underneath the boilers, and 1,200 people are thrown out of employment until the water falls. No further damage is reported.

NEW YORK, March 22.—The only feature discernible in yesterday's stock market was its dullness. This dullness was the exact reflection however of the doubt and hesitation which prevails in all financial circles over the next probable development in the Cuban question.

NEW YORK, March 22.—The Holland submarine boat made another trip from Perth Amboy, N. J., yesterday. At a depth of 15 feet under water she showed a good speed and was handled with ease. After she came to the surface the boat grounded in the mud and was hauled off by a tug. The boat's conning tower will be fixed with electric lights before another trip is made.

LONDON, March 22.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "Senor Sagasta, the premier, declares that the government has not received the report from the Spanish naval court on the Maine disaster; that no definite news has come from Washington in the matter and that all statements with reference to the United States claiming indemnity or offering to submit the Maine question to arbitration are pure inventions."

SACKVILLE, N. B., March 22.—To give some idea of the work done in the harmony department of Mount Allison conservatory by C. L. Chisholm, who three years and six months ago founded its present advanced school, may be of interest to music teachers and students. He has corrected over twenty-three thousand individual examples for the students and has given public illustrations of every section of the treatises used in his department in the form of original composition by himself and has now a number of bright girls, who write original composition with facility, using the finest material in their work.

MONTREAL, March 21.—The burning question in this city to-night is whether Montreal is to have a repetition of the disastrous flood of 1886. Thousands of people to-day lined the shores of the river St. Lawrence and watched the ice-laden waters, and hundreds of men strengthening the dyke with blue clay. Merchants whose stores are on the streets likely to be flooded were at work removing their goods from their cellars, where this precaution had not been adopted some days ago. The city pumping stations are hard at work in an endeavor to keep the sewers clear, and so far have been fairly successful. On Mill street water has flooded the ground floors of large industries, and the result is that a couple of thousand men will not be able to go to work in the morning. The cellars of a number of large wholesale establishments on Victoria square and Craig street have been flooded, but the goods had all been removed. At Longue Point the ice has shoved up over the road, and a number of houses have been flooded.
