

Khrushchev Dizzy At Cognac Party

BERLIN (AP) — Published reports that Nikita Khrushchev is not in the best of health may result from a midnight spell of dizziness the Soviet premier is reported to have suffered in East Berlin last month.

The Hamburg tabloid Bildzeitung Saturday quoted unidentified East-bloc diplomats — Helsinki as saying Khrushchev was under doctor's orders to take it easy after suffering a fainting spell.

It may go back to a gala reception for Khrushchev in East Berlin's Soviet Embassy March 10. Khrushchev was at his party best, knocking back cognac and:

coasts with gusto and quipping with the ladies.

SIGNS OF EXHAUSTION

But once in a while he showed exhaustion. His eyelids grew heavy and he seemed to shrink within himself. For four days he had changed around the Leipzig trade fair making speeches and when he arrived in East Berlin March 7 his face was grey with exhaustion. Still, he kept up the killing pace.

But on the night of March 10, according to Hans Ulrich Kempf, veteran correspondent of Munich's respected Sueddeutsche Zeitung, Khrushchev was leaving the embassy with his entourage and:

"I was just about to go when Khrushchev suddenly turned back. He was supported by two men. He was pale and walking unsteadily. He sat down. Bodyguards closed the doors. Lights were turned off.

DIY SPELL

"The few people present were badly shaken, as is possible, when you don't know what is going to happen to one of the most powerful figures in this world at the next moment. After two minutes, the uncertainty was over. There was nothing really serious, only a bit of dizziness."

Responsible Soviet diplomats in East Berlin shrugged off the Kempfki report.

"Khrushchev was very, very tired," is all they say today.

The Bildzeitung item — an eight line item buried on page 2 — added something new. It said doctors had told Khrushchev to slow down because they were worried about his high blood pressure and excessive weight.

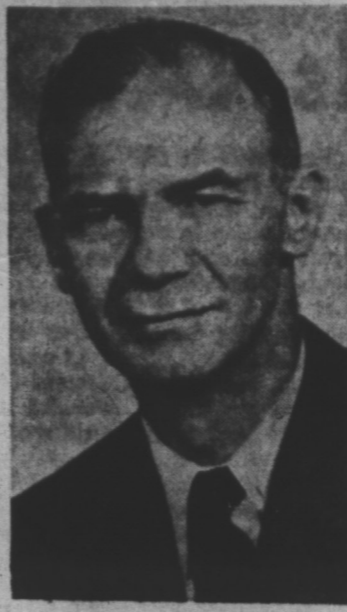

SUMMERSIDE — John S. Wright of Summerside has accepted an invitation to attend the Atlantic Congress in London June 5-9 marking the 10th anniversary of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Mr. Wright will be one of a group of 15 parliamentarians and 30 distinguished Canadian citizens attending. It is understood that he will be the only representative from P.E.I. in the non-parliamentary group.

"The congress will be attended by 650 delegates from the 15 nations that make up NATO. Its purpose is to review the organization's achievements during the past 10 years and discuss a restatement of its aims for the following decade.

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II will open the congress before leaving on her Canadian tour.
