SIR WILFRID ON PROHIBITION.

His Answer to the Dominion Alliance

IS REGARDED BY THEM AS DISAPPOINTING.

Will Not Likely be Accepted by Prohibitionists.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

TORONTO, March 11.—Alderman Spence, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, has received from Sir Wilfrid Laurier the answer of the Government to the request of the Alliance that the prohibition measure be introduced into the Dominion parliament, following upon the plebiscite of last fall.

The premier announces that the expression of public opinion recorded at the polls in favor of prohibition did not represent such a proportion of the electorate as would justify the introduction by the Government of a prohibitive measure.

A meeting of the Alliance committee will be held in this city on Tuesday to discuss the Premier's answer.

Secretary Spence regards the answer a certainly disappointing and not likely to be accepted by the prohibitionists.

Of these 49 are for acts of incorporation; 52 amendments to acts of incorporation; 6 divorces; 1 winding up act, and two for extensions of letters patents.

The total number of railway bills to date is 56; of which 12 relate to the Yukon district.

EXTENSIVE ALTERATIONS

More improvements. A SAD AFFLICTION.

Young Man Blind—A Warning to Young Men.

It is our painful duty to chronicle the sad affliction which has befallen Leander Simpson, son of John Simpson, Esq., Hope River, Lot 21. For a while he had been complaining about his eyes but did not think it anything very serious until some time in January he consulted Dr. McNeill, of Stanley, and Taylor, of Charlottetown, who found his eyes in a very bad condition. In spite of all their efforts Mr. Simpson has gone completely blind in one eye and the other is almost useless. The cause of this unfortunate affliction is thought to be the excessive use of tobacco, to which the afflicted had become addicted. Great sympathy is felt for him and his family as he was a general favorite among all—and especially as he is only twenty-three years of age.

IN AND AROUND POWNAL.

The changeable weather is producing its usual crop of sickness. Men, women and children are suffering with la grippe, pneumonia or measles. But providentially there has been no fatalities here as yet.

Pownal school district is highly favored in having such excellent teachers. They are first-class in every respect; and thorough and rapid work is being done. As superintendent of the Juvenile Templars she gathers the children into the large room, one evening in each week, immediately after the school closes, and holds a lodge meeting, where a pleasant and profitable hour is spent; and thus in early youth the children have the principles of temperance inculcated that will keep them from the tempter's snare all through life. The wise man says, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it."

Now Mr. Editor if every school on P. E. Island and all over our fair Dominion, would follow the worthy example of Miss Carver and institute Juvenile Lodges, what an army would be raised up, taught to touch not, taste not, handle not, the maddening bowl that causes so much misery, want and crime? It is useless to look to Governments to pass a prohibitory law, because they secure their election largely through the rum element, and the use of the fire-water itself. So we must educate the people, and in no other way can it be done so surely, so easily, and well as by starting with the child. We hope this matter will be taken up, and acted on for it is far-reaching in its results. The Government might be induced to give a bonus to teachers who would engage in this great work.

A few evenings ago the Superintendent invited all the little Juveniles to a feast of good things, when, after enjoying themselves with games and recitations they returned to their homes feeling that it was good to be there. Thus another link was forged in the golden chain that binds the pupil to the teacher and superintendent.

ARRESTED AT THE ALTAR.

Hungarian Murderers' Marriage Ceremony Interrupted.

VIENNA, March 8.—Rosa Komlosy, the maid-of-all-work to a widow living alone at Esseg, in Hungary, recently murdered her mistress with a hatchet and buried the corpse a few inches deep behind the house. After sleeping soundly in her mistress' bed, says the Neues Wiener Tagblatt, which tells the story, she next day removed all the furniture of the house to Mohacs, where her fiancé was living.

The corpse, however, was soon found, and the Esseg police tracked the murderers to Mohacs, where she was about to be married. Just in the middle of the wedding ceremony, as the bridegroom, according to Hungarian custom, was about to place a wreath of myrtle on his bride's head, the police entered and arrested Rosa Komlosy for murder.
