But Mrs. G. belongs to the Junior League of the Charlottetown Hospital, Mrs. Q. to the Junior Ladies Aid of the Prince Edward Island Hospital and Mrs. J. to the Women's Committee of the Confederation Art Gallery. They're clubwomen with a big project to tackle and they'll get it nicely tucked away before turning in earnest to their own summertime pursuits.

Their task is to make sure there are sell-out crowds at the opening nights of three of the summer's top attractions at the Confederation Centre Theatre.

The League is sponsoring the July 12 opening of "Spring Thaw", the satirical Canadian review that will be the first stage production in the theatre's "festival of laughter".
