Briarly Browne, Dean of Ontario, said upon receipt of cable requesting choir's presence in London. Directed for the past 12 years by George N. Maybee, seen at left with his charges, Kingston cathedral choir has a total of 50 treble boys choristers. From this group, 40 will be selected for the overseas trip by individual voice tests and by their musicianship.

SS General Faces Mass Murder Charge

PARIS (AP)—Former SS Gen. Karl Oberg, whose wartime reign as secret police boss of occupied France earned him the title "butcher of Paris," went on trial before a military court Monday. He was charged with mass executions and racial arrests.

Brought to trial with Oberg was his ex-adjutant and fellow SS officer, Col. Helmuth Knochen. The two are accused of slaughtering nearly 1,000 hostages, 80,000 de-

H. STEWART MACMICKEN

The sudden death of Mr. Stewart MacMicken came as a great shock to his many relatives and friends here and abroad.

GREER GARSON, WALTER PIGEON STAR AT CAPITOL, SUMMERSIDE

—Moviegoers will take Greer Garson and Walter Pidgeon to their hearts in "Scandal at Scourie," their eighth co-starring vehicle at the Capitol Theatre. A tender, warm-hearted drama permeated with a quiet humor and at its high points unashamedly tugging at your heartstrings, it tells the story of a devoted but childless couple who adopt a little orphaned girl and, as a result, find themselves the victims of social and political animosity in a small Canadian community.

Pidgeon is cast as Patrick McClesney, forthright, honest, upstanding leader in the small town of Scourie, Ontario. He is a store owner, chief of the Fire Department, a respected member of his Protestant church and a candidate for the provincial legislature.

When his wife, Vicki (Miss Garson), discovers the little orphan, Patsy, who has become homeless because of the accidental burning of a Catholic orphanage, she determines that she and her husband will raise the little girl as their own. This starts off an unexpected holocaust when McClesney's political opponent accuses him of having adopted Patsy in order to win over the Catholic vote, an attack which is brought to an even more ferocious point when the schoolhouse is set afire with Patsy accused of arson. It would rob the story of suspense to reveal its outcome here. Sufficient to say that Vicki enters the fight to vindicate both Mr. McClesney and Patsy's honor and comes out victorious.
