LI HUNG CHANG HAS LEFT SHANGHAI

Pacification Will Take a Long Time.

RUSSIAN TROOPS ON THE WAY TO CHINA.

Reported Looting of the Imperial Bank—Important Capture.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Aug. 23.—“To-day 1500 Americans attacked the Imperial Palace,” says a despatch to the Morning Press from Peking, dated August 18, “and captured four of the courts.

“The American flag is flying over the Imperial Granary. The Imperial Bank has been looted.”

Li Hung Chang has left Shanghai for Peking.

Count Von Waldersee says pacification will take a long time.

There are 35,000 Russian troops on the way to China by various roads.

The Japanese minister says that as long as the Empress Dowager lives there will be trouble.

BAD NEWS FROM CHINA.

Missionaries and Native Christians Reported Murdered.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—The American Bible Society has received a letter from Rev. John R. Hykes, its agent in China, dated Shanghai, July the 17th. Following are the more important points in the letter:—

“The director of the China inland mission has had telegrams from most of their stations in the Sze Chuen province which show that the anti-foreign crusade has not yet reached the far west; that the feeling of uneasiness in the valley of the Yang Tse continues, and that outrages are multiplying; that the Roman Catholic bishop and the priests have been massacred in Hong Chow and their property destroyed; that the missions in King Tehchend, in the Kiangsi province, have been destroyed; that the foreigners, including the consul and the customs staff, have left Wenuchow, in the Cheking province, 200 miles south of Shanghai.”

He adds:—“Since I wrote the above word has come that 60 foreign missionaries and 100 native Christians have been murdered in Tai Yuen Fu. This will not be published until it is confirmed. The missionaries from Kai Feng Fu, in Honan, are on their way to the coast and are having a terrible experience.”

So Far So Good.

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 21.—The Sultan has ordered a commission to investigate the recent massacre of Armenians in the Saseun district of Asiatic Turkey. In the meantime his majesty has relieved Ali Pasha of the command of Bitlis.

Wanted Fitz to Lose.

NEW YORK, August 22.—The World says that Bob Fitzsimmons has been offered \$100,000 by a Canadian of high financial standing to lose his fight with Sharkey, and that Fitz treated the suggestion with contempt.

KRUGER ISSUES A PROCLAMATION

Counter to That of Lord Roberts.

HE GIVES THE BOERS SOME ADVICE.

Tells Them It Will Avail Them Nothing to Lay Down Arms.

LONDON, August 23.—Kruger, according to a despatch from Lorenzo Marques to the Express, has issued a proclamation counter to the latest proclamation issued by Lord Roberts.

The Transvaal president says: “It will help you nothing to lay down your arms or to leave the commandos. Every step homeward means a step nearer St. Helena.”

WEDDING PARTY MASSACRED.

Horrible Slaughter of Filipinos by U. S. Cavalry.

WASHINGTON, August 21.—Thomas W. Jones, private in Troop G, Eleventh Cavalry, writing from Santa Cruz, Philippine Islands, to his brother here, describes a massacre of Filipinos in which he took part on June 25th. Sixty members of his regiment were ordered out to kill or capture a famous Filipino general known to be living in the neighborhood.

The general's house was located, and the Americans crawled through the underbrush until they secured positions but a few yards distant. Then they discovered that they had unwittingly chanced upon a wedding. The Americans were ordered to fire a volley from ambush and then charge, which they did with terrible results.

“The scene that resulted was horrible,” writes Private Jones. “On the ground near the house lay the body of the bride, whose brains had been blown out. The bridegroom, who had received a bullet in the stomach, was lying near by in a dying condition. Twelve of the Filipinos had been killed, and about the same number wounded. An elderly woman, was shot through the leg, and a little child had her arm shot off.”

Bresci Asks For Delay.

ROME, August 21.—Bresci, the assassin of King Humbert, has asked for a postponement of his trial until witnesses can arrive from the United States.

War on the Anarchists.

BERLIN, August 21.—The German police have agreed to stop all anarchist meetings, and four have been suppressed in Berlin.

It is said that 186 foreign anarchists, of whom 103 are Italians, have been expelled from Germany since the assassination of King Humbert.

Fatal Result of a Quarrel.

HAMILTON, Ont. Aug. 21.—Barney Keegan was burned to death, Tom Martin was fatally burned, and there was a property loss of \$50,000 as the result of a fire in the Hamilton hotel yesterday morning. Keegan and Martin retired to a room at the hotel late last night. A quarrel ensued, during which a lamp was upset, igniting the bed clothing. Before the fire was under control twenty or more residences and business buildings were destroyed.

A New Russian Loan.

LONDON, August 22.—It is reported in Odessa, according to a despatch to the Daily Express, that in consequence of the strain upon Russia's financial resources owing to the Chinese campaign, a specially accredited representative of the Russian Minister of Finance, M. Dewitte, has concluded, or is about to conclude, “an arrangement with a syndicate of all the great insurance companies of the United States for a loan of 300,000,000 roubles.

MOVEMENTS OF SIR CHARLES TUPPER.

Passes Through St. John And Moncton

ON HIS WAY TO THE TOWN OF AMHERST.

Hopes to Have Hugh John Coles Here With Him.

MONCTON, Aug. 23.—Sir Charles Tupper, in passing through Moncton yesterday, was met at the depot by a large number of prominent citizens.

After holding an informal reception in his car, by request he stepped on the rear platform and delivered a short address.

He said he had met Mr. Foster in St. John and had arranged for a public meeting in Moncton on September 6th.

Sir Charles was received with hearty applause on making his appearance and there were loud cheers as the train moved out.

Many friends of the grand old leader were glad to see him so vigorous and fit in every way for a campaign which the Conservatives in this section are ready when the Government may decide to bring it on.

St. John, August 25.—Sir Charles has passed through en route to Amherst.

He said he did not know whether the election was coming soon, but he proposed to act as if it were on hand.

Mr. Foster will go to P. E. Island with Sir Charles. Sir Charles hopes to have Hugh John Macdonald attend the New Brunswick and P. E. Island meetings.

A Fiend's Handiwork.

ARLINGTON, Minn., August 21.—Theodore Wallert, a farmer living three miles from town, last night killed his wife, a boy of 19 years, a girl of 16, and a baby. He then set fire to his barn, destroying the stable with nine horses and a full hay barn. Mrs. Wallert had been trying to secure a divorce, the couple having separated. Wallert entered the house through a window and slaughtered the family with the exception of one child, a boy, who was wounded, however, and probably will die. Wallert fled.
