

New Mapping Scheme Being Used In Canada

OTTAWA (CP) — A federal aerial survey team passed a milestone in Canadian mapping this week with a new method that will be put to good use on the Atlantic coast.

Using newly-developed electronic measuring equipment known as the Aerodist, the team obtained enough information in five days to map a 300-square-mile area in western Ontario.

Officials of the surveys and mapping branch of the mines and technical surveys department said Friday that it would have taken ground parties more than three weeks to collect the same amount of information. The Aerodist was developed in South Africa and was used this week for the first time in Canada in a large-scale mapping project.

USE THREE PLANES

The Aerodist equipment is carried in a DC-3 aircraft which operates in conjunction with two helicopters. The planes are provided under contract by Canadian Aero Limited of Ottawa.

This highly complicated system involves the use of equipment to measure distances and aerial photographs. Distances are measured by sending radio waves from the DC-3 to ground stations which are moved from point to point by the two helicopters.

At the same time as distance measurements are made, photographs are taken of the terrain. These two simultaneous operations provide all the information that is required for the later production of maps on a scale one mile to the inch.

The Aerodist system also will be used to map the islands and shoals in James Bay and part of Hudson Bay and to pinpoint on maps the best fishing areas on the Grand Banks off the coast of Newfoundland. The latter job will be done in conjunction with a ship which will seek out such areas.

MAP SABLE ISLAND

Available records show that Sable Island, 120 miles off the Nova Scotia coast, has been the graveyard for more than 200 ships, most of which met their end in the late 1800s.

Many of the wrecks occurred because mariners had no charts showing the exact position of the island which is about one mile in width and 20 in length. Its position has been fixed out by astronomical measurements and is not precise.

Improved aids to navigation have eliminated in large measure the danger posed by this island. However, its exact location still is unknown, making it a potential navigation hazard, especially during severe storms.

With the Aerodist, it will be possible to fix the exact location of the island on navigational charts.
