

Saint Dunstan's Win McCurdy Cup

Blank Halifax Wanderers 11-0 In Hard Fought, Sudden-Death Game

SAKOVILLE, N. B., Nov. 23 (Special)—The powerful Saint Dunstan's University football team returned here Saturday to complete their sweep of Maritime football honors and win the McCurdy Cup by defeating the determined Halifax Wanderers 11-0 in a hard fought game on Mount Allison University field.

For a little more than two hours the two teams waged a titanic battle and run struggle before the A. J. MacAdam coached Saints proved their right to carry the McCurdy Cup across the Northumberland Strait for the first time in history.

Unfortunately, however, the Saints won't be carrying the famous trophy across the straits. It's now being held as a hostage by the Glace Bay Canadians as a result of their "Stone of Scone" act of a week ago. When the Cup is surrendered it will likely be taken to the Island by an official of the Maritime Rugby Union.

The fast moving Saints raced into a 5-0 lead in the sudden-death game. After grimly holding on during the early part of the last half they came back to score two tries and subdue the red clad Maritime senior champions from Halifax.

The Saints accounted for all their points on three tries and a penalty kick. Fleet-footed Paul Jay crossed the Wanderers line twice and Floyd Gaudet once while Pete Dunphy collected the other two points on penalty kick from 20 yards out.

The game was a wide-open, hard running and vicious taking affair. The rival backfields opened up with terrific runs on several occasions, only to see their efforts stopped by bone-jarring tackles.

The Saints forwards played an outstanding game and therein probably lay the difference between the two squads. Time and again the S. D. U. forwards followed up on long kicks to nail the Halifax backfielders or gain possessions of a loose ball.

Big Bob MacFarland, 166 pound wingman on the Halifax team, John D. MacDonald and T. D. Chaisson, former St. P. X. stars, carried much of the mail for the Wanderers. The three posed a definite threat everytime they got the ball and several times they broke through for long runs.

Despite the rain and wet weather of the past week the field was in remarkably good shape. The game was played under cloudy skies in as good weather as one could desire at this time of the year.

First Half

The Saints kicked off to open the first half and carried the play into the Wanderers territory. Play ranged between mid-field and the Wanderers 25 during the first four minutes with the outstanding feature being the hard tackling of Charlie Cheverie.

Just at the five minute mark the Saints were awarded a penalty kick on the Wanderers 20. Pete Dunphy took the kick from the most directly in front of the posts and booted the ball over the bar with about six inches to spare.

The Wanderers raced back into S. D. U. territory but Freddy Driscoll and Cheverie stopped the attack with vicious, low tackles that rocked the Halifax ball carriers in their tracks.

The Maritime College champ-

ions then started their march into the Halifax end once more. Lloyd Gaudet raced for 20 yards through a maze of Halifax players and started the play for the first Saints try which came at the fifteen minute mark.

From the two man scrum which followed shifty Clarence MacDonald broke out with the ball. He passed to Pete Dunphy who in turn passed to Phil Coyle. The latter ran for several yards before heaving a pass to Jay on the wing. Paul outdistanced three Halifax defenders for the last fifteen yards to score in the far left hand corner.

At this point of the game it looked as though the Saints would win by a one-sided score. They came right back into Halifax territory but wingman John D. MacDonald of the Wanderers made a run that changed the tide of the game.

John D. raced for 30 yards to breakaway with only Reardon to beat. Jackie outguessed him and as MacDonald cut in Reardon caught him low with a beautiful tackle. The tackle was made in almost the same spot where Reardon stopped Yeadon two weeks before on a breakaway two weeks before.

That seemed to be the signal for Halifax to go on the attack with spectacular runs. The Saints forced the play back into the Halifax end only to see Bob MacFarland break out on a 60 yard run down the sidelines. The Saints came back again and this time T. D. Chaisson brought the ball into S. D. U. territory with a 40 yard dash.

The Wanderers outthrew the Saints 15-7 during the first half. They had the major portion of the two-man scrums but Ronnie Melvor, aggressive S. D. U. forward, hit the Halifax ballhandlers for losses on most occasions.

Second Half

The Wanderers forced the play into the Saints end just after the second half opened but Allan MacDonald stopped their first thrust with a hard tackle. However the Wanderers kept pressing with Buzzy Tuck setting up Fred Lordly for the Halifax's most dangerous threat of the game.

Lordly advanced to the Saints three yard line before being stopped on the play. The Wanderers were given a penalty kick on which they failed to capitalize but they kept the ball inside the Saints ten yard line for the next five minutes.

Finally the Saints worked the ball up the field with a series of kicks and runs by Pete Dunphy. Following a number of scrums in Halifax territory the Saints clicked for their second try.

Once again it was Paul Jay who raced across the line with a 15 yard run following a half line play. Pete Dunphy picked the ball from the scrum and passed to Flying Quarter Allan MacDonald. The latter relayed the ball to Clarence MacDonald who passed to Coyle. Phil's long pass to Jay was perfect and sent him away in the clear.

That try took the spirit out of the Halifax team. The Saints raced on a loss ball to score the final try of the game. Gaudet followed up fast from a scrum to grab the ball just as it crossed the line. For the remainder of the game Saints dominated the play with a series of runs and passes, the best of which was a long gain by Pete Dunphy and Charlie Cheverie.

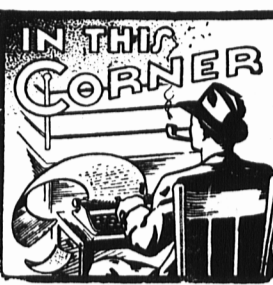
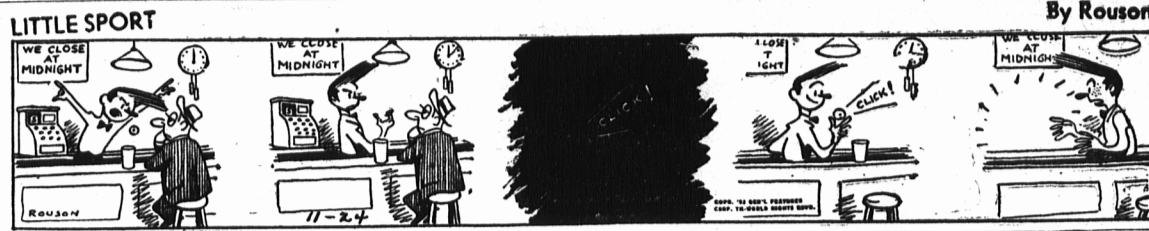
The game was handled by Don Kerr of Halifax. He went light on the penalty kicks calling six against the Saints and four against the Wanderers. The heel-outs in the scrum during the last half were eleven aside.

The Saint Dunstan's University football machine, the most polished collection of rugby players to come out of Prince Edward Island for longer than one cares to think about, brought this province its first McCurdy Cup on Saturday afternoon. A salient group of players who were equally brilliant on the attack and on the defense this year's Saint Dunstan's team will undoubtedly rank alongside the All-time great teams of English Rugby in the Maritimes. Coached by A. J. MacAdam, who was assisted by John Eldon Green, the Saints established a record for the season's play that surely must compare with those of the greatest teams of the past.

In rolling to their first McCurdy Cup championship and supremacy in the Maritime football world the Saints racked up a total of 73 points while having only seven points scored against them. This is a record which we believe will be difficult to beat. It was set in seven games which gives the Saints an average scoring record of 10.4 points per game. Four of their games were won by shutouts and on only one occasion during the season's play was their line crossed by an opposing player.

The Saints had to fight most of the way Saturday in turning back the Halifax Wanderers by an 11-0 score to win the coveted cup. The Wanderers were one of the strongest teams the Saints met during the year and until they cracked late in the last half the issue was in doubt. However, when they second try to make the score 8-0 you knew the game was decided. It was then that coach A. J. MacAdam knew that he had made a sweep of the Maritime football honors for the 1952 season.

Two Maritime championships within two weeks is the proud record of this Saints team. A remarkable point about the team is that all the players except one are Island-born boys and this fact alone has caused more than one Maritime sports official to express some little amazement. It has been proposed that a Provincial and City testimonial dinner be held at the Charlottetown for the players and coaches in recognition for the honor they have brought to themselves and the Island during these past few months.

As might be known this honor has not come without a lot of hard work. Thursday afternoon at Saint Dunstan's is a half-holiday and the only afternoon of week that the Saints have free permission to visit the City. Many of these Thursday afternoon's the players spent on the football field. We recall seeing Jack Reardon being taught how to tackle a man on a breakaway one Thursday afternoon by the assistant coach. How well this paid off was shown later. In the final inter-collegiate game Reardon saved the game for the Saints with his tackle of Yeadon on a break. Saturday he had to make the same kind of a tackle on John D. MacDonald.

The easiest way to describe the Saints is by the words balance and organization. Every player in every position was a star in his own right.

TORONTO, Nov. 23 — (CP) — Maurice Richard, hockey's all-time scoring king, fired two second-period goals in 25 seconds Saturday night to salvage a 2-2 National Hockey League tie for Montreal Canadiens against Toronto Maple Leafs. The goals brought his lifetime output to 527. Canadiens were behind 2-0 when the Rocket caught fire before 14,157 fans for the first time since he beat Nels Stewart's goal-scoring record of 324 two weeks ago.

The great 31-year-old right winger came through when Leafs were threatening to add to their two first-period goals. Richard beat goalkeeper Harry Lumley at 13:25 and again at 13:50 with Leafs' Ron Stewart sitting out a tripping penalty.

Leftwinger Gord Hanmigan and rightwinger George Armstrong beat goaltender Gerry McNeil for the Toronto goals.

Tempers flared from the opening whistle. Referee Red Storey handed out 23 minor penalties plus a 10-minute misconduct to Montreal's Elmer Lach. That was one short of the record for most penalties in one N. H. L. game set earlier this season by Leafs and Detroit Red Wings.

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Halifax Atlantics Eke Out 5-4 Win Over Glace Bay Miners In Overtime

HALIFAX, Nov. 23 — (CP) — Bill Ford's ricocheting shot from behind the goal gave Halifax Atlantics a 5-4 overtime victory over Glace Bay Miners Saturday in a Maritime Major Hockey League game before some 3,400 fans.

Ford's goal—his third of the game—brought an abrupt end to a scrumbly game in which Miners, back-checking doggedly and playing well, had a two-goal lead in the first two periods and then fell apart under steady pressure in the third.

In the overtime period, Miners spurred again and it was anybody's game until Ford, trapped against the boards behind the net, flipped the puck toward a bunch of players in front of goalie Don Lockhart.

The puck zipped into the net off a Glace Bay player before Lockhart could move.

Campbell and Gould were the other Halifax scorers. Cooper, with two, and Verrier and Miller were Glace Bay's marksmen.

Miners had a slight territorial edge in the first period, when Miller scored the only goal. Bob Verrier scored near the midway mark of the second.

Atlantics scored their first goal with a Glace Bay player in the penalty box. Ford deflected a long pass from Frank King and Joe Lepine.

Then Cooper made it 3-1 while Halifax had a man short.
