

S'side Y.M.C.A. Reports Experimental Year

SUMMERSIDE — The annual meeting of the Summerside Y.M.C.A. was held last night in the "Y" Centre, Green Street, and Vice-President Alan Stewart presiding in the absence of Keith Lapp, president.

There are now 17 members on the board. Five of these members represent a like number of Summerside churches.

Reports were heard from the president; Miss Sherry Chalk, president of the Y-Y Council, governing body of the Y-H.Y. groups under sponsorship of the Y's Men's Club; Mrs. Eleanor Key, president of Y's Menettes; Charles Ballen, president of Y's Men's Club; James Murphy, chairman of world service.

The reports indicated a very extensive program being carried on by the Summerside Y's Men's Club which is the service club of the Y.M.C.A.

The reports disclosed that five H.Y. chapters, four cub packs, two scout troops, three brownie packs and two girl guide enterprises use the Y-Centre each week.

The Y.M.C.A. contributed \$265.50 towards world service last year partly through the sale of life savers by H.Y. members.

The Y.M.C.A. continued to rent the swimming pool in Charlottetown for the use of all the youth participating in the many groups.

Merville Campbell was added to the board of directors for a term of 17 months.

The president's report from Mr. Lapp which was read by

Mr. Stewart, reviewed the highlights of the year. Mr. Lapp said it had been a "year of trial and experiment."

His report also stated it had been a year against which future plans can be weighed and formulated.

SWIMMING POOL

The report said "quite apart from our planned expansion, we were invited by the provincial minister of health to undertake the organizing of public support for the completion of a swimming pool being provided for in the Prince County Vacation-at-High School. To this end we convened last fall and held a well attended meeting of those who were thought would be interested in the venture. The outcome of the meeting was a decision to ask the Summerside recreation commission and its members and to set up a sub-committee to carry out further investigation."

Looking to the future, the president reported "the future expansion of our program it is felt that a specialist approach is necessary. The volunteer leadership can be organized to carry out the arrangement set times and enrol interested participants in the specified activity rather than the more general approach of the past year."

TO CLEAR WAY FOR S'SIDE PARK

At least part of the project is considered possible under the writer's works program. Its completion is necessary for the elimination of pollution in the harbor.

CLEAR WAY FOR PARK

When this is accomplished it will clear the way for use of the harbor for swimming and plans are already underway for establishment of a park along the shore front at the west end of the town.

The Town of Summerside, the Village of St. Eleanors, and the provincial government have all expressed a keen interest in

the proposed park, and the provincial government through the minister of Health, Dr. Hubert B. McNeill, has indicated that provincial support will be given to the park project when steps have been taken by the town to eliminate the harbor pollution through the installation of a disposal system.

These related topics are likely to be the principal subjects for discussion at tonight's meeting of the Summerside Board of Town-Beings held at the P.E.I. Bag Co. Ltd., Water Street. It is expected that representatives of the town, the provincial government, and St. Eleanors village will attend the board of trade meeting so that the views and interests of these various groups can be compared and discussed.

More Trained Teachers For Retarded Seen Need

"We have not kept pace with bricks and mortar in training people or teaching the teachers," stated R.E. Shaw, president of the Canadian Association for Retarded Children in a talk to members of the local association yesterday afternoon at Sherwood Hospital.

Mr. Shaw, who is in Charlottetown on a brief visit, met informally with a few members of the association and left immediately for Toronto.

"We have built tremendously in the last 12 or 15 years from the days when parents gathered church basements, but our progress has left us with many problems. We have built the schools but not trained the people to run them."

Mr. Shaw was greatly impressed with Sherwood Hospital. He said, "I understand a P.E.I. has approximately 100 children receiving some training, but as the percentage of retarded children in Canada is estimated to be three per cent of the population, this province has 12,000 short in its facilities."

Children who attend schools 10 years ago have now taken everything they can from the school and are ready for the sheltered workshop. This aggravates the problem of trained personnel. There is a great field of research and training to improve our methods with the retarded adult to be added.

Mr. Shaw pointed out that there is still basically the same group of parents who got together years ago and started the movement. This creates a problem in organization, making decisions based on emotion as a lack of success in enlisting active support from the world at large.

At a Saint John press conference Mr. Thompson indicated he isn't concerned about ice-breaking which allows winter navigation on the St. Lawrence River—a complaint of port interests in Halifax and Saint John.

"Anything that's progress is something we should not try to prevent. What's good for Canada in one part is good for Canada in all parts," he said. In principle, what he needs is not more restrictions but less restrictions, and let some of these other things take care of themselves."

He also said he favors extending Canada's territorial waters limit to 12 miles offshore instead of the present three miles, to prevent foreign fishing vessels from coming into Canadian waters and using fishing methods denied to Canadian fishermen under conservation laws.

In his speech here Mr. Thompson spelled out a defence policy with two goals:

1. Organization of mobile military "flying squad" equipped with modern conventional weapons to meet emergencies at home and abroad.

2. Support of the United States nuclear retaliation force. "Helping the United States to maintain a high relation to Canada's best defence precaution," he said.

At the same time Mr. Thompson, who has differed with Deputy Leader LeRoy Coakley on the issue of Canada acquiring nuclear defence weapons, "The tattered and torn argument as to whether Canada should or should not accept nuclear weapons is a futile and ridiculous one."

Ronald M. Rickard, who is general superintendent of the operation, said negotiations had already been carried out without success and that the company would start firm on its previous offer of \$3.25 an hour.

The truckers, who are not working on the project, had been seeking a yard-mile rate which they said would give them \$5.10 per hour on the basis of two loads an hour.

Truckers actually employed on the job apparently were satisfied to haul at the company rate.

The unemployed truckers were asking for a share of the work and for a higher rate. In all, 30 unemployed truckers picketed the site Monday and blockaded exits to the excavation.
