

# Hellyer Gives Blunt Warning To Canadian Aircraft Industry

OTTAWA (CP) — Informed sources said here Defence Minister Hellyer has given the Canadian aircraft industry a blunt warning not to put pressure on his department to buy the jet plane which the industry wants to build.

They said the warning is the frankest given the industry since former prime minister Diefenbaker cancelled the Arrow interceptor in 1959 and pre-

cedes the meeting of the Air Industries Association at Quebec City Monday.

Mr. Hellyer said in the Commons Thursday his department could postpone a decision on acquisition of a tactical jet fighter for some time "but in view of the urgency of giving support to the industry we have been giving early consideration to this matter and hope to be able to make a decision soon."

But the defence department, faced with the problem of buying new aircraft and naval ships at the same time, is said to believe it can make do with a much less expensive plane.

Sources said the Phantom will perform a greater variety of roles than a less expensive plane but that this advantage probably isn't worth the extra cost.

The problem boils down to this: Will defence or economic policy have the upper hand in this decision?

This is not a new dilemma for Canadian governments, of course, but in this case the Liberal administration had already determined on a defence budget of \$1,330,000,000 a year for five years.

If the defence department is

to acquire an expensive plane at the same time as ships and new army equipment, this ceiling may have to be raised.

Though it would prefer to hold off a decision on a plane, the defence department is prepared to make up its mind now—that decision is compatible with defence policy.

Informants said Mr. Hellyer was warning the industry not to try to push him into buying a plane he doesn't want—or he'll start pushing back.

## Macquarrie Seeking Transportation Data

OTTAWA — Detailed questions about transportation problems on P.E.I. are being placed on the Commons' order paper by Heath Macquarrie, MP for Queens.

"In the light of the reluctance of any minister to provide information on this important subject, a study to get as much detailed information as possible through order paper questions," Mr. Macquarrie told the Ottawa Bureau of The Guardian.

Among the questions he is asking are whether any of the officials or agencies of the government are studying the effects on freight movements to and from P.E.I. which might result for the construction of a causeway which

not include railway tracks. What is the estimated cost of constructing the causeway with and without a railway line? What ferries now operate on the Borden to Cape Tormentine service, when were put into service, the cost of construction of each one and the total operating cost for all such ferries each year for the past 10 years?

The Queens' MP is also asking how many autos, trucks, trailers and buses were carried by the ferries each year since 1953 and how many railway cars were carried in the same years and the amount received from the sale of transportation tickets in these years.
