TREATY WITH THE INDIANS.—It is announced from Ottawa that Hon. J. H. Ross, of the Northwest Territories, Hon. David Laird, Indian Commissioner, and Mr. J. A. J. McKenna of the Indian Department, have been appointed to negotiate a treaty with the Indians north of Athabaska now extending from the Rocky Mountains to Hudson Bay. The commissioners will leave Edmonton next May. They will be away six months.

ABBIES AND VICS. AGAIN

The Stars Whitewashed--The Saints Lose by One Point.

There were two hockey matches played in Hillsborough Rink last night, and the games were witnessed by one of the largest gatherings of the season. The Abegweits of Charlottetown, met and defeated the Stars of Summerside, the score when time was called standing 8 to 0 in favor of the home team. In the match between the second Victorias and the St. Dunstan's team the points were more evenly divided, the Vics. having three to their credit and their opponents two when the game closed.

The game between the Abbies and Stars was called at five minutes after eight, Mr. James Sullivan manipulating the referee's whistle. For about fifteen minutes after the rubber was in play the game was interesting and lively, and the puck was kept in the Stars territory most of the time.

Then Sullivan shot for the Abbies, taking the puck out of a scrimmage near the Stars goal. Subsequently the same player shot another goal which the Stars protested and the Abbies agreed to ignore. After the face-off the rubber was kept moving about at a lively rate for a few minutes, and then Unsworth scored for the Abbies. There were no more points made during the half. In the second half the play was all in the Abbies favor, the home team shooting six goals and the visitors not scoring at all. The goals were made by Howatt, Bethune, McLeod and Unsworth.

This game was refereed by Mr. A. C. McIntyre, of Montreal. In the first half the Saints made two goals, Brown and McPherson scoring. The Vics failed to score.

There was blood in the Vics. eyes when they came out for the second half, and a few minutes after the face-off Farquharson placed the rubber between the Saints goal posts. A little later on W. Collings repeated the trick for the same side, evening the score. For the rest of the half the play was exceedingly lively and the admirers of both teams made the rafters ring with their encouraging suggestions. It was not until time was almost up that Mabon shot for the Vics, placing them one ahead. This was the last goal made.

The promoters have fitted up their establishment with the most modern machinery, and have brought from Holland a distiller of wide experience and great ability.

THE LAKE ONTARIO.—A Quebec despatch says: Captain J. E. Bernier, of North Pole fame, has left for St. John's, Nfld, where he will await the arrival of the steamship Lake Ontario, of the Beaver Line, about Wednesday next, and pilot her up to Paspébiac. The delay to the Gaspesia has compelled the company to charter this steamer, which according to advices, sailed yesterday from Mirford Haven, for St. John's, Nfld, and Paspébiac. She has 350 passengers, including the new Governor of Newfoundland and his suite. On arrival at St. John's, Captain Bernier will pilot the Lake Ontario to Paspébiac.

YOUNG MAN DEAD.—It is with regret that we record the death of John A. McDonald, teacher, which took place at Gaspereaux on the 18th January, at the age of 26 years. He had been in failing health for about a year, but still, with his usual perseverance, he continued teaching until forced by extreme weakness to give up his school. For the last two years he taught at Little River. Mr McDonald was a young man of a gent and was looked upon as one of the best teachers. His funeral, which was largely attended, took place at Surgeon, High Mass being sung by Rev. J. C. McLean, of St. George's, the absolutions at the grave being performed by the Rev. Stephen Phelan, of Georgetown.
