650 CAMERS

The camping committee report expressed satisfaction that a total of 650 members of the association had attended the 23 registered camps held last summer. depicting the set up of civil defence and its integration with such organizations as Red Cross in the provision of clothing, food, shelter, registration and inquiry and other personal services on an emergency basis.

The necessity for providing proper registration and inquiry services for victims of disaster was dealt with in a very comprehensive manner by Mrs. Clive W. Currie of Charlottetown who participated in a course on this phase of disaster work at Arnprior this spring.

James Jay, chairman of Red Cross Disaster Services at Morell, told of preparations made by his committee to provide refreshments for some 150 volunteers who were involved in the search for three children from Bangor who recently strayed away from home.

However, just before the coffee and donuts arrived at the scene the children were found and the rescuers returned their homes so there was no necessity for the services so thoughtfully secured by members of the Morell Red Cross Disaster Committee.

Mr. Baker, executive director of the Protestant Family Service Bureau at Charlottetown, and Mrs. Clive W. Currie were the special speakers at a Provincial Red Cross Disaster Committee meeting held last evening at Red Cross headquarters in Charlottetown.

Robert Younker of Charlottetown, provincial chairman of Red Cross Disaster Services, presided at the meeting which was well attended by representatives of Red Cross Committees at Kensington, Summerside, Montague and Morell. Judge J.S. DesRoches, of Montague, president of the P.E.I. Division, Canadian Red Cross Society, extended a welcome to all those in attendance.

In describing the various welfare services which would be required in the event of a major disaster resulting from enemy attack or from natural causes Mr. Baker said: "To be prepared for something that may happen, is better than not to be prepared if something does happen."

Leod, showed the club in a sound financial position. In his report he also stated that 1,066 cows were bred with fresh semen, 339 with frozen semen and one with frozen special semen.

The club has a membership of 270 plus one life member and was the first to organize herd improvement. During the past year the club has also purchased a holding unit.

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3 Minesweepers Due On Thursday

Three Royal Canadian Navy Minesweepers, H. M. C. S. Resolute, H.M.C.S. Quinte, and H. M.C.S. Fundy, will be arriving in Summerside at noon on Thursday for a two-day visit.

The ships are expected to dock at the Marine Wharf in Summerside at noon and will bring 18 officers and about 140 men on the courtesy call.

Shortly after their arrival returns visits will be made between the ships officers and the office of Mayor W.A. Currie, and with Group Captain J.C. Creeper.

On Thursday evening there will be a reception on board the ships for a group of invited Summerside citizens, and later in the evening the town will host to the visiting officers at a civic reception at the Golf and Country Club.

On Thursday evening there will be a softball game scheduled between players from the ships and a local team, and roller skating will also be part of the Thursday evening entertainment.

On Friday the officers from the ships will motor to Charlottetown where a dance will be held in their honor at the navy barracks, and in Summerside the sailors will be guests at a dance at the diner.

The ships will sail from Summerside on Saturday morning. This squadron of three ships are under the command of commander A.C. Campbell, who is the commanding officer of the H.M.C.S. Resolute.

The H.M.C.S. Quinte is under the command of Lt. Cmdr. R. P. Mylrea, and the H.M.C.S. Fundy is commanded by Lt. Cmdr. M. S. Norton.
