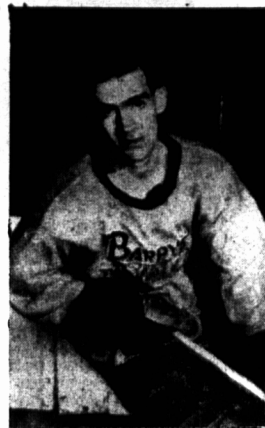
Parkdale Flyers Stronger Than Ever This Season
