Charlottetown And Pictou Route

SYDNEY, May 1.—The steamer "Constance" is lying at McKinnon's Wharf undergoing extensive improvements and getting in readiness for service in the Pictou Charlottetown route which it opened up and operated in a highly satisfactory manner during the season of 1921.

Upwards of twenty men have been employed on the "Constance" during the past two or three months enlarging her equipment and making extensive improvements which will render her even more capable for this important service than she proved to be last year. A beautiful promenade deck has been built, a new house constructed on the upper deck, providing a commodious and comfortable smoking and reading room for the male passengers. There is also under construction a roomy new cabin for the general use of the passengers. This is on the main deck. New toilets and wash rooms have been built, furnishing every convenience of the kind to the travelling public.

Under deck also accommodations are also being remodelled and enlarged and special quarters fitted up for the exclusive use of lady passengers. The "Constance" is being painted white and with the extensive improvements noted above, presented a smart and tidy appearance. She will begin the service daily between Charlottetown and Pictou as soon as the ice permits on the first of May, leaving Pictou for Charlottetown on the arrival of the train from Sydney in the afternoon.

facts remain as a stigma and disgrace to the partisan perpetrators employed and paid by the Bell Government.

The Tax Act enjoins secrecy as to the amount of the assessment upon the individual taxpayer. It is a necessary provision as it is claimed, for the protection of the taxpayer's credit in some cases. But, that as it may, how has this secrecy been kept? By the editor of The Patriot, himself a member of the government, proclaiming for partisan purposes how much a certain Mr. Frizzell was called to pay, and by Honorable Messrs. Lea, Crosby, Hughes and other Liberal members citing for their places in the House how much certain citizens of Charlottetown are now compelled to pay compared with what they paid under previous governments.

The Opposition are denied every means of knowing, or learning whether these statements are true or untrue. They have no access to the facts, which are evidently an open book to members of the government and to any member supporting them in the House. These men deny every obligation of secrecy imposed by the law and by common decency in this matter. They openly break the law themselves have made in the hope of party gain. In this they have stooped to a degree of degradation unknown by any government or legislature now in existence. No parallel can be found for such gross malfeasance, and the perpetrators have neither denied nor attempted to excuse their perfidy.

In their administration of the Tax Act "their offence is rank; it smells to Heaven." And we can't forget that the administration of the Tax Act is under the direct supervision of Hon. Walter M. Lea. We charge him here and now as the responsible head of that department, and therefore a principal offender. By merit raised to the bad eminence of Tax Master General he has been a principal agent in bringing about the intolerable conditions above set forth, which have made the name of his Department and that of his minion stink in the nostrils of thousands of our people as did the names of the publicans of old.

It is so true that the imposition of unjust and needless taxation aroused the just resentment of the people to a degree never before known. It is equally true that the conduct of the Commissioner in office as above in part set forth and his insulting words to the taxpayers as often quoted, have added contempt to the popular indignation. His refusal to resign when called upon to do so by his former supporters, carries with it the further reproach of cowardice. If he dares to plead to this indictment, let him do so. If not let him ask his own neighbors whether or not it is true.

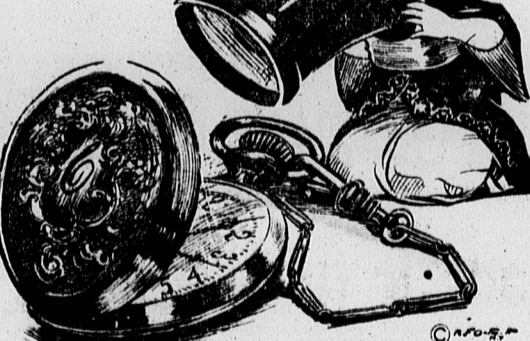
