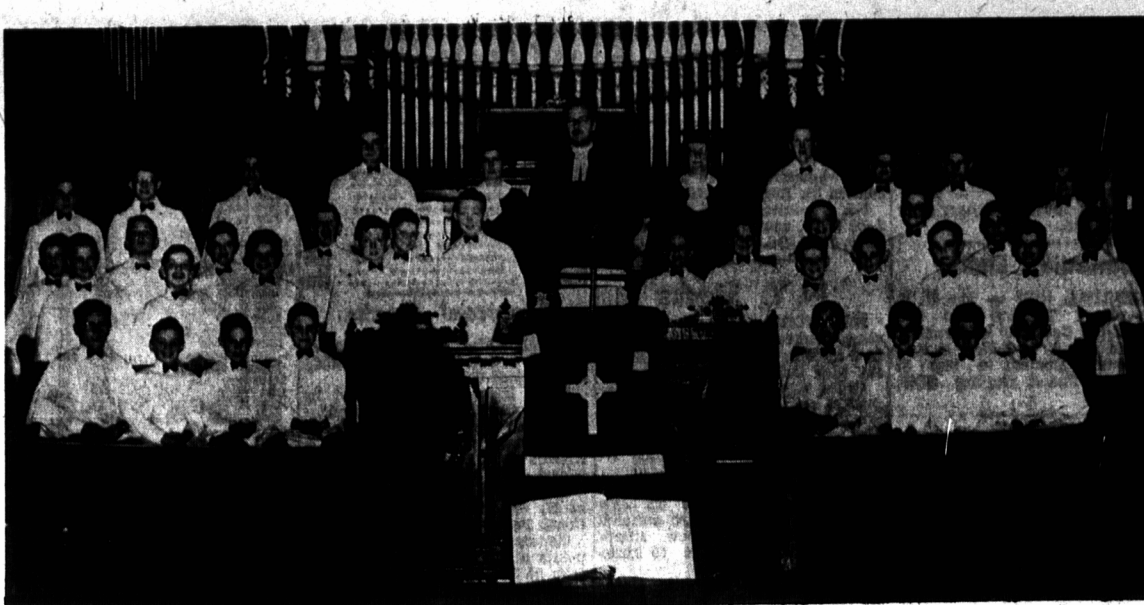

Gives Invitation To Celebrations By Acadians

OTTAWA (CP)—Next summer 1250,000 Acadians will commemorate the expulsion of the Acadians 200 years ago and the rest of Canada was invited Monday to take part in the observances.

H. J. Robichaud (L—Gloucester), a descendant of one of the French-language Nova Scotian families expelled from Annapolis valley farms in 1765, tendered the invitation in the Commons.

Mr. Robichaud said the observances will not be used to revive old bitter feelings but to observe officially and solemnly the rebirth and survival of the little group.

He said about 15,000 Acadians were expelled two centuries ago and fewer than 6,000 or 7,000 survived the exile. Today descendants were settled in the Maritimes, Quebec, New England and Louisiana.

Observances in various Acadian centres of Louisiana are being held at the present time, he said. Ceremonies will be held in such Maritime centres as Grand Pre, N. S., Moncton and Caraquet, N. B., and in some Quebec centres during the summer.
