

direct, supported on Corinthian pillars of variegated marble; at the same time I could not, as I read in gold letters on the establishment "The Old Summerside Bank," help contrasting it with the little wooden building situated in a narrow street, which I knew as the "new Summerside Bank." There were four, or as I think, five other Banks shown to me, all highly respectable places of the kind, but not equal in appearance to the one called the "old Bank." The various Churches were then pointed out, the appearance of which was creditable to the piety and taste of the inhabitants. I was especially pleased with the College, at which there were, my guide informed me, upwards of one hundred and fifty students, besides the resident masters and bachelors of arts. The Library and Museum, attached to the College, as well as those belonging to the citizens, were extensive, well filled, and interesting. The Supreme Court and General Court of Appeal was now sitting," he said, "and I might as well take a look in." We did so. I was highly pleased with the appearance of the five Judges. Nor was I less gratified at hearing among the names of the Barristers, the old and familiar ones of Hodgson, Peters, Palmer, Lawson, Alley Hensley and others, the grandsons and great grandsons, as my guide informed me, of the original stock. After hearing a case or two argued, we left. Would you not like, said my guide, an evening paper, and meeting a news boy, he purchased one, and handed it to me, remarking at the same time that it was the Summerside Journal, the first newspaper ever published in this City. It is now a daily paper; there are several other papers published here he said. On my way back to the hotel, having invited my kinsman to dine, I began to enquire as to the sources of this commercial wealth. In former times, said he, our ancestors were, as I have understood, merely farmers, and not particularly skillful ones either. Now every acre is cultivated in the most scientific style, and the land made to bear the utmost that can be raised from it. Then again our merchants were in the habit of exporting all sorts of produce in the raw and unmanufactured state. We have altered all that. I have been informed that formerly they salted, and in a coarse rude manner dried that valuable fish, the cod, and exported it stored into casks and screwed down. They are now put up cooked or semi-cooked, by artists of the highest skill, so that a whole codfish, with lobster sauce, has only to be warmed and is fit for the table. We have, besides, imported through the Piscicultural Society, Turbot and Soles, and a variety of other fish, from all parts of the world, and naturalized them in our own waters. I must show you our extensive beds of Oysters, comprising hundreds of acres. We cultivate the Lobster. The quantities of roasted, boiled and stewed meats that are annually sent by the Great Pacific Trunk Railroad and its numerous branches through what was formerly termed the Hudson's Bay Company's Territories, would astonish you. The produce of our merchants form no small item of our exports, and these we have discovered the means of preserving in all their freshness for upwards of a year, and in every climate. Our breed of sheep—always good—have been wonderfully improved, and instead of exporting the skins and fleeces, they are kept at home, and the one made into leather, and manufactured into boots and shoes; and the other spun and woven into cloth. We have naturalized the vine, and though our wines cannot compete with those of France and Germany, they serve for home consumption, while our cider is nearly equal to champagne.

I have heard or read, said I, that great opposition was made to the confederation of the Colonies, and more especially by the people of Summerside. "Yes, and they were glad enough to come into it at last. In fact, sir, fifty years ago the people of Summerside, and the majority of the whole Island, were short-sighted people, very illiterate "old fogies." Stop!" said T., and preparing to give my young gentleman a sound lecture for his presumption and ignorance, I thus addressed him, but hearing at that moment my name called out in a sharp shrill voice, I turned round to ascertain the author of this interruption, when the face of my wife met my view, and I was informed that it was full time for me to get up. Displeased as I was I—yes, I got up.

Their valuable property known as "Pope's Store," was recently sold at Auction for the handsome sum of \$227—Mr. Walter Keating being the purchaser. Mr. Keating, a few hours afterwards, sold it to Messrs. H. & J. Ramsay, for £1000. This will give some idea of the value of property in this rising Town.
