A CENTENARIAN DIES.—Mrs Sarah McNeil, a native of Cape Breton, died at East Boston recently, at the advanced age of 100 years. Her sight and hearing were remarkably good up to about two months ago, when she complained of not feeling well. Last week she became very ill and rapidly weakened until the end came. She was buried at East Boston.

POLICE COURT.—This morning John Stewart was fined \$5 or 30 days for fast driving. Vernon McIntyre, for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$5 or 30 days. The Joseph-Ewing assault case was dismissed. James McNally, for being drunk and incapable, was fined \$5 or 20 days. ST DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—The women's mission closed yesterday afternoon at half-past three, and the men's mission began at half-past seven and will continue during the week. During last week about two thousand women approached the tribunal of penance, and a large number of them subscribed to the total abstinence pledge. The services during the men's mission will be at five and eight o'clock in the morning, and at half-past seven in the evening.

THE PLEBISCITE.—Qualifications for city voters on the coming plebiscite election: Every male person being a British subject of the age of 21 years. Must be the actual owner or occupier of estate of the yearly value of \$6. Must have owned or occupied the same for six months previous to the test of writ of Election. On having paid poll tax for the present year 1898, and who has resided in the Electoral District for twelve months, and in the polling Division one month next before the test of writ.

BYERS WINS.—A late New York despatch says: George Byers of Boston, (formerly of Charlottetown) and Frank Childs, of Chicago, colored heavyweights, fought 20 hard rounds at the Lenox A. C. Club to night. After taking an awful lot of punishment, Childs held his ground until the limit was reached. Byers out-fought and outpointed him and was declared the winner. Childs and Byers weighed in at 165 pounds each. Childs' left eye was badly bruised and swollen from a succession of left jabs in the fourth round.

BAD STATE OF AFFAIRS.—The correspondent of the London Times at Candia, island of Crete, who has just landed after five days in the Roadstead, says: "About 600 men, women and children were either buried alive or massacred in the outbreak last week. The Turkish troops are now patrolling and blocking up the streets. The Mussulmans are ransacking the ruins of the burned quarter of the town where the devastation is complete. Blood is visible everywhere. Such bodies of the slain as were not burned were removed yesterday in parts and buried in the town limits."
