United Church Urges Higher Tax On Liquor

SACKVILLE, N. B., June 14 (CP)—The Maritime conference of the United Church of Canada today adopted a resolution urging the Federal Minister of Finance to increase the tax on hard liquors in Canada.

The resolution was one of several adopted at today's session of the 27th annual session of the conference. Others urged appointment of a provincial director of temperance education in New Brunswick and commended the press where ever and when it has criticized the hypocrisy of professional sports masquerading under the guise of "amateur" status. The resolutions were contained in the report of the committee on evangelism and social service. Other recommendations of the committee will be considered at a later session.

should arise their training would enable them to meet it and perhaps save a life. "You are now members of the medical profession and your responsibility is a great one."

Inseparable The speaker said that psychiatry has tried to show that there is nothing between the mind and the body, illness of one can cause illness of the other. "You can't separate them." In the past, he said, the public has been ashamed of mental disease, but anxiety is the basis of mental illness and is present in all of us. "A man with anxiety has a fear. He is ill."

He continued that the mentally ill need someone to cling to so they might recross the canyon

between the mentally ill and the mentally sound. The doctor urged the girls to keep the confidences of their patients and only to reveal them to the doctor when such revelation might mean provision for a greater therapy to help cure them. He warned the girls to keep their sense of humor and to learn to live and develop some spare time activities for the sake of their own mental health.
