Traffic Signs Placed In S'Side

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — Police Chief Peter R. White has taken action to alleviate the traffic congestion on Summerside's Water Street, the main thoroughfare of the town. Signs were erected yesterday at the intersections of three approaches leading on to Water Street from the south side which prevent cars from making a left turn. These signs were posted at the approaches to Water Street from Queen Street, at Holman's and at MacCausland's. From now on no cars coming out from these driveways will be compelled to turn right with the traffic. Chief White stated that as well,

heavy white lines from the curb to the middle of Water Street, on both sides of the crosswalks at the intersections of Summer and Spring streets, will be laid, at which traffic will have to stop if pedestrians are in the crosswalk or have stepped over the curb intending to cross. According to the town by-laws pedestrians have the right of way in all crosswalks or other designated crossings once they have stepped over the curb. Of course pedestrians who cross at other than designated crossings do so at their own risk. It is hoped by the police that they will use the crosswalks from now on.

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — Two local men are back in their homes here Wednesday after spending 21 hours lost in the woods about 15 miles south of Sussex, N.B. They had been the object of an intensive search by RCMP and volunteers since 7 p.m. Tuesday.

Micmac 'Uprising' Follows Arrest

SUMMERSIDE — A near riot occurred among the people of Lennox Island Wednesday as a result of the arrest of one of the inhabitants, Indian Agent, Hugh MacNeill said in County Magistrate's Court here yesterday.

The incident occurred following the arrest of Lloyd Joseph Sark, who while in an intoxicated condition, is alleged to have entered the general store of Gardner Newcombe and ordered a quantity of yeast and molasses to make more beer.

Mr. Newcombe refused to comply with the accused's orders which resulted in Sark jumping over the counter in an effort to get what he wanted.

Mr. MacNeill said that when he tried to restrain the accused, Sark turned and struck him in the face with his fist.

The Indian Agent noted that serious repercussions resulted following the accused's arrest, to the effect that a window was broken in the store and at one time it was thought necessary to call in the police.

Sark appeared in magistrate's court yesterday on three separate charges, that of assault, by striking the complainant in the face with his fist; damage to property, one Toledo weighing scale to the amount of \$30; and being intoxicated on an Indian reserve.

Following a plea of guilty to each of the three charges, Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald sentenced the accused to one month on each charge, with sentences to run concurrently.

Magistrate MacDonald observed that the accused was scheduled to appear on Nov. 24 for sentence on a similar charge which occurred last June.

Also on yesterday's docket was a resident of Tignish, Harold Robert Keough, who was convicted of having in his possession a quantity of spirits, illegally manufactured. The accused was sentenced to six

Supreme Court Makes Awards

SUMMERSIDE — In a civil action case heard before Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy in the Supreme Court here Wednesday, Anselm J. O'Brien of St. Eleanor's was awarded damages in the amount of \$325.

The case before the court was that of Mr. O'Brien versus Edgar Jervard of St. Eleanor's and resulted from an automobile accident last July.

In another civil action case heard the previous day before Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan, Charles D. Ahearn of Borden, plaintiff, was awarded damages in the amount of \$380. The defendant in the action was Lloyd Mayhew of Tryon.

The case resulted from an automobile accident last August. The plaintiff in both actions was represented by J. Watson MacNaught, QC.
