White House Drew Together Kennedys, Friend Declares

NEW YORK (AP)—The White House probably drew the John F. Kennedys closer together than they had ever been before, says Paul B. Fay Jr., a long-time friend of the late president.

Fay, former undersecretary of the navy, writes of the Kennedy relationship in his book *The Pleasure of His Company* to be published Sept. 7.

"The roles of president and first lady tended to demand that they stand apart from others, which in turn gave them many more hours together," Fay writes.

Fay—nicknamed "Red"—and Kennedy had been close friends since the Second World War when they served together in action in the Pacific. Kennedy appointed Fay undersecretary of the navy in 1961 and he served until 1965.

ASKED ABOUT DIVORCE
One day in 1960 when Kennedy's candidacy for the Democratic presidential nomination was widely recognized, Fay says the two were playing golf.

Fay said he asked Kennedy about a rumor that the Kennedys were having marital differences.

"The story was going around," Fay told him, that "Jackie is staying with you only until you are nominated or the election is over, and then is going to divorce you." The information was supposed to have come from one of Mrs. Kennedy's closest friends.

Fay said he wanted rebuttal directly from Kennedy so he could kill the rumor.

"Jack looked at me calmly as though I had just told him that his shoe was untied."

STORY FALSE
"Red," he said, without a flicker, "the story is false, but I wouldn't feel all that confident about killing it if I were you. People who spread stories like that don't want to accept a denial."

Fay also mentions briefly the rumor of a "secret marriage" by Jack Kennedy before his marriage to Jacqueline.

"The president was less disturbed by that irresponsible gossip than I was," Fay notes. He said he urged the president to make a statement at a press conference about it.

WAS UNCONCERNED
Resigned and unconcerned, Jack said, "Red, if I make a statement to the public on anything I have been accused of, I'd spend all my time on radio and television trying to keep the record straight. If people want to believe such tales, no denial on my part is going to convince them differently."

About the death of his second son, Patrick Bouvier Kennedy, less than two days after his birth in August, 1963, Kennedy spoke to Fay only once.

"It is so hard for Jackie," he said. "She wanted so to have"

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another child. Then after all the difficulties she has in bearing a child, to lose him is doubly hard.

Kennedy did not brood over the tragedies that were beyond his power to change, says Fay. "John Kennedy was a happy man, and those who knew him well will always remember him that way."

Charlottetown Gun Club Moves To New Quarters

The Charlottetown Gun Club is in its new quarters at Mount Herbert.

Last month the range and facilities were moved from Winsloe to the farm of Earl Ings. The range has been laid out for trap and skeet shooting and club members regard the new setup as the best in the province. So far this season, one shoot has been held at the Mount Herbert site and that one saw Harley Ings score the first 25 straight in skeet. Harley is the club's secretary-treasurer.

Trap and skeet shooting had its start in this province back in 1932 when the late George Howard organized a club. Some of the men participating at that time were: Ralph Jenkins, Wallace Rodd, R. L. Coles, Harry Tidmarsh, Bob Hyndman, Ed Nicholson, T.W.L. Prowse and Judge H. L. Palmer.

During the war years activity ceased but it was revived again in 1947 when facilities were moved to Squaw Point, near the present rifle range at Alexandria. Conditions posed a problem there and the club moved back to Winsloe on Wally Rodd's property in 1948.

At this location, activity flourished and the club really came into its own. In 1955, after taking the name of The Charlottetown Gun Club, the range at Winsloe was host to a centennial shoot. At that time gunners from all over Canada displayed their shooting talents. The following year the local club was host to the Maritime shoot, an event that ran three days. Facilities for three skeet fields were made along with the range for trapshooting.

This club has produced many outstanding trap and skeet shooters who have won honors in provincial and Maritime competition. In 1954 the five-man team trophy was won at the Maritime shoot by Ron Atkinson, Bob Hyndman, Hugh Simpson, and Ted Woodruff.
