



## Adele Wiseman: The Writer-in-Residence

Cut the much honored Canadian novelist Adele Wiseman and she bleeds fiction.

That is why Wiseman is passionately committed to serve students and anyone interested in writing plays, poetry, and fiction.

For one to be a good writer, Wiseman stresses the importance of reading as a key to better standards for writing. "Your writing must be set in such a way that people will want to read your work" she says.

What is the responsibility of the writer to society? What is the role of the artist? A writer in a society reflects a voice and conscience of members in a community. According to Wiseman, "An artist is a witness." She adds that the writer has a responsibility to tell what is perceived in such a way as to reveal

to the audience the significance of the truth. "That is what literature is like" she says.

Wiseman's opinions of the woman's movement are quite vehement. "It's time women took their places — the other half of the world," she says. She is also quick to point out that her feelings towards the feminist movement are mentioned in her book *Memoirs of a Book Molesting Childhood* which is a collection of essays to be published by Oxford press and released at the beginning of October.

Wiseman feels that most writers are offended in repressive governments such as South Africa where the state of emergency, the proclamations restricting freedom of the media is in effect. She says the mandate of a good writer is to tell the truth.

Participation in international writer's organization has kept Wiseman busy. From publication of her novel *The Sacrifice*, she is a Governor-General's Award winner for fiction. Her other novel is entitled *Crackpot*. She has written two plays but published only one called *Testimonial Dinner*. She has also published a biographical book about creativity, *Old Woman at Play*.

Tribute should be paid to the generosity of the Canada Council and the UPEI Alumni Association that have enabled Wiseman to render her services at UPEI.

She is available for consultation at the Robertson Library Room 202 on Thursdays till the end of November. She welcomes students and others who would like to talk about writing.
