THE TRANSVAAL: WAR TO-MORROW

Report Comes by Way of The Hague

VICTORIA WRITES TO WILHELMINA.

Kruger Personally Peaceful—Canadian Volunteers not Wanted.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Oct. 2.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily News says: "According to advices from the Hague, Dr Leyd, the European representative of the Transvaal, has named Tuesday as the day for a formal declaration of war by the Boers.

There is an unconfirmed rumor in circulation here that Queen Victoria has written to Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands deploring the turn events have taken in South Africa and assuring the Dutch Monarch that she has gone to the utmost limits of her constitutional rights in her endeavors to secure peace.

The Daily Telegraph's despatch from Pretoria says: "Even now President Kruger would personally appeal to the Queen and Lord Salisbury, but that such an act would be construed as a weakness.

JOHANNESBURG, Oct. 2.—Commanding orders are completed and the Burghers are ready for the field.

A large body passed through town yesterday afternoon.

Business here has virtually ceased. Merchants have finished barricading their premises and proprietors of drinking saloons expect to receive official orders to close their establishments today.

A party of two hundred Germans have been notified to leave.

An Irish corps, commanded by Blake, an Irish-American, will go the front early in the week.

OTTAWA, September 30.—Lieutenant Colonel Pinault, deputy minister of militia, has sent the following to those military officers throughout the country who have volunteered for service in South Africa. "In reply to your enquiry, I have the honor to state the last news received from the war office in London is to the effect that the imperial authorities are not recruiting for the army and are not preparing any expedition (of recruits) to Africa. Therefore it would be fruitless to forward your application to England." From this it will be seen there is little likelihood of a Canadian contingent being raised for service in the Transvaal.

At a meeting of the Maritime Breeders' Association held at Halifax on Friday a committee was appointed to see what can be done towards securing a more equitable rate for cattle on the I. C. R. and other railways.

Mr F. G. Bovyer, Georgetown, said that as an exhibitor from P. E. Island he felt that Nova Scotia deserved great credit for the exhibition she had put on and for the generous in for which it was opened to the exhibitors from other provinces.

He recommended the exhibition commission to try to arrange with the railways for better treatment to shippers of stock. He for one had lost an animal he valued at \$125 through the rough way he had been handled by the Intercolonial railway in coming from St. John to Halifax, and he would be corroborated by many other stockmen when he said the treatment given the second trainload of live stock shipped from St. John on the 20th inst. was simply outrageous.

Mr. Bovyer, then announced that he had just heard from the P. E. Island government that it was proposed to hold an exhibition at Charlottetown next autumn open to the three maritime provinces.
