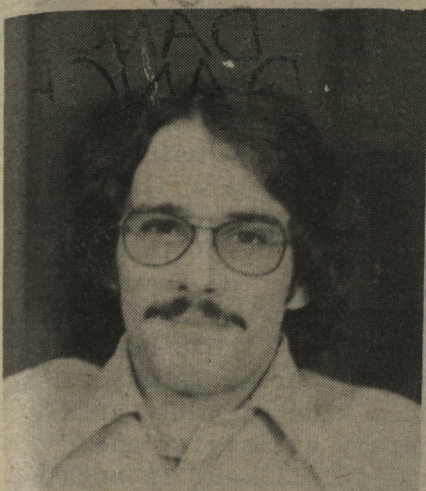


Candidates for President
