DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Estimates for P. E. Island

OTTAWA, May 20. The session yesterday was spent in committee of supply, when the Tarte-McGreevy affair was again thrashed out upon a vote for the salary of Mr. Perley, the Chief Engineer of Public Works, who is implicated. Mr. Laurier was in the House for a few minutes. Sir John Macdonald attended both sessions—afternoon and night. Ex-Speakers Kirkpatrick and Oimet have been appointed Privy Counsellors of Canada, but they are not members of the cabinet. The estimates contain an item of forty thousand dollars for the extension of Cape Traverse wharf, and five thousand for the removal of the Summerside station; six thousand dollars for repairs to piers and breakwaters—one thousand dollars for Miminigash—twenty-five hundred dollars for Port Selkirk; forty thousand for dredging, and twenty thousand for extra running expenses of the P. E. Island Railway. There is also an increase of thirty-two hundred and fifty dollars in the pay of the Charlottetown post office clerks.

A Terrific Storm.

Eleven Men Buried Alive.

GEORGIA, May 20. Terrible storms have occurred in Texas. The town of Mount Vernon, the county seat of Franklin County, was struck by a cyclone yesterday. The post-office and several houses were demolished. Eleven Italians were buried alive yesterday by reason of a cave-in.

Disastrous Explosion.

NEW YORK, May 20. A terrific explosion of Ajax gun powder occurred on board a train at Tarrytown, N. Y., yesterday. Fifteen Italian workmen were killed and many wounded. The tracks were wrecked and the cars completely destroyed. The explosion also damaged the telegraph lines, and trees were uprooted and an immense hole blown in the earth.

LONDON, May 20. Sir Charles Tupper has a parting shot in yesterday's Times on the Grand Trunk matter. He asserts that it is now proved that the Grand Trunk went to shameful extremes in order to aid the ruined gamblers who attempted to subvert British institutions in Canada.

Snowstorm in Germany.

BERLIN, May 20. There was a heavy fall of snow on Sunday throughout central and southwestern Germany. In many places the snow was a foot deep. In some places the roads were blocked.

Canadian Immigrants.

MONTREAL, May 20. Three hundred immigrants arrived in Montreal yesterday. They are Norwegians and Finns, and come well provided with money.

TORONTO, May 20. The Toronto street railway difficulty is at last settled, and the road will be transferred to the city without further opposition.
