The hose was turned on and the fire was put out. The origin of the fire is unknown. The cargo was pretty well soaked, but otherwise the damage to the vessel will not amount to much.

THE ISLAND STEAMERS.—In accordance with the rules of the Dominion Government, the steamer Princess of Wales was obliged to go on the ship at Pictou for survey this week. Her place has been supplied by the str. M. A. Starr. The examination having been satisfactorily passed, the Princess of Wales will return from Pictou to-morrow afternoon with the mails, etc.

A CRANK'S VAGARY.—A Boston man named W. C. Trussell has been staying at the Balmoral Hotel, Montreal, for some time past. He has been sick for the past week, and on Sunday morning, thinking he was about to die, requested that one of the flag poles from the roof of the hotel be transferred to the window of room on which the American flag could be displayed, so that under the flag of his country he might die. The manager consented and the flag consequently floated from his window all day Sunday before the eyes of the supposed to be dying man. The effect seems to have been salutary, for on Monday morning he was much improved.

THE BARS CLOSED UP.—The Frederickton Gleaser says the liquor dealers have held a caucus, and, it is understood, "decided to close up their bars for a while. At any rate the old places are now shut up, there is no sign of liquor about, and a general feeling of dryness is said to prevail." It adds: Quite a run is reported at the barracks canteen and officers' mess, and it is said that a number of the unfortunate imbiber, who, in consequence of the cruel action of the liquor men, been so sadly cut off from all means of "whetting their whistles," are being cared for at these places.

TWELFTH OF JULY CELEBRATION.—The St. John Telegraph says: At the last meeting of the committee it was decided to invite Nova Scotia, P. E. I. and New England Orange Lodges, to participate in the 12th of July celebration in this city, and invitations have accordingly been forwarded. Some of the lodges in Boston and vicinity had previously intimated their desire to be present. In regard to the dress to be worn it was deemed advisable to have the city lodges appear in black clothes with silk hat, while the visitors will be permitted to wear soft felt hats, of uniform pattern, with cord instead of band about the crown.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Bad For Emin Pasha.

LONDON, Dec. 5.

A despatch from Zanzibar announces that Emin Pasha met with a probably fatal accident to-day. Being near sighted he walked out of a window by mistake and fell on his head, fracturing his skull. He now lies at Bagamoyo in a critical condition. All the doctors except Stanley's physician declare Emin's injuries fatal. Stanley's physician is hopeful of saving Emin's life, but says under the most favorable circumstances the patient cannot be moved for at least ten days. Stanley will arrive at Zanzibar on Thursday aboard the German man-of-war Sperber. Emin's people come on a British man-of-war.

A Sensational Elopement.

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.

A sensation has been created here by the elopement of Mrs. Campbell, wife of Colin Campbell of the Militia Department, with Fredk. O'Connor, a young man possessed of some means and well connected. Mr. Campbell belonged originally to Digby County. His wife left three young children. Mr. Campbell knew of their intended flight, but could not prevent it.

Another Cashier in Trouble.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.

In Congress to-day the Speaker laid before the house a communication from the late sergeant-at-arms of the house informing him of cashier Silcott's defection. Whereupon the house adopted a resolution authorizing the appointment of a select committee to examine the accounts of the office of the sergeant-at-arms, and report.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.

The Government have received an order in council setting apart Constance Cove, B. C., for the exclusive use of Imperial war vessels.

Shot by a Moonshiner.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 6.

At Butler, Mo., on Tuesday night, United States Marshal G. P. Willis was shot and killed after he had fatally wounded Pierce Morgan, a moonshiner, who was resisting arrest. Morgan died yesterday.

Gun-boat Stranded.

LONDON, Dec. 4.

The British gun boat Watchful is stranded at Lowestoft County, off Suffolk. The Watchful is a composite vessel, of 560 tons, with four guns.

EXPORTS.—The imports of King's Co., N. S., for November were valued at \$7,973, duty collected \$1,600. The exports were valued at \$24,800, of which potatoes furnished \$16,645, the quantity being 12,549 barrels.

PRICE OF SUGAR.—The St. John Sun says: There is a firmer tendency in yellow sugars. Redpath, of Montreal, asked an eighth of a cent more on Tuesday than he asked last week. Owing to keen competition between the refineries, sugar is about half a cent cheaper here than in the States.

ISLAND HORSES.—The St. John Telegraph says: The P. E. I. horses brought to St. John, yesterday, by Mr. W. S. McKie, are probably the best lot that have arrived in the city this year. The majority of the animals weighed from 1,200 to 1,600 lbs. Among the lot are some excellent drivers.
