QUESTIONS IN EXAMINATIONS.

Sir,—Some days ago I was shown the questions which were given to candidates at the recent examination for entrance to the Prince of Wales College and Normal School. They were shown to me by one of the unsuccessful candidates, who ascribed his failure to incompetency in arithmetic. I found, however, that the young lady in question had a fair, practical knowledge in arithmetic, as well as of the other branches taught in common schools, and that in addition she was a good Bible scholar, and was familiar with many good authors, and was otherwise a very intelligent person. It is then but fair to assume that there are many similar cases, and that many of the candidates who failed to solve the difficult problems in arithmetic or to answer the technical questions in English, geography, history, etc., are yet practically well educated young ladies and gentlemen. Now I do not wish to say anything in disparagement of the attainments of those who have been successful. Yet, judging from the questions given, is there anything to prove that they are really well-informed young men and women? It is not possible for a person to pass such an examination and yet know little but what is contained in the meagre pages of his textbooks? In regard to the questions in arithmetic, I feel confident that the majority of the teachers will support me in saying that they were altogether too difficult, and that they were not of a practical nature. They embrace an almost thorough knowledge of the Science—an acquisition which requires many years of hard study and careful tutorage and one which can be acquired only by neglecting more important subjects. Outside of the teaching profession, how many persons in this Province have occasion to solve such problems as are annually placed before our embryo teachers? For my own part, when I look back over my own school days, I cannot help thinking of the long and weary hours spent in the old schoolhouse wrestling with the knotty questions in Gray and Thompson and Colverton. How much of that precious period might have been better employed in reading good books or in working upon your father's farm. In the paper in English there is a passage from Goldsmith's "Traveler" to be analyzed. Out of curiosity I asked a number of teachers to give the analysis of the quotation. Some gave it one way and some another, but none seemed to have a decided opinion upon it. By the rules of grammar, the parts of an ordinary prose sentence are easily distinguished. Poetic license, however, often renders the passage ambiguous or to some extent obscures the real meaning. Indeed, I have seen the professors holding different opinions concerning passages.

The papers in geography and history are such as are calculated to continue that most undesirable mode of acquisition—cramping. A teacher said to me a few days ago, "Why does the Superintendent give questions to candidates which he could not answer himself?" But I do not think that Mr. McLeod or Dr. Anderson are any the less qualified for their positions even were they unable to name one of the branches of the Ottawa River, the canal of Ontario or the lakes of Newfoundland.

HOW TO EXTERMINATE HIM.

Late news from Hong Kong shows that Dr. Kitasato, of the Japanese Imperial medical commission, has discovered the true bacillus of the plague that has slain thousands in Canton and Hong Kong.

Kitasato has studied under Koch and is the foremost biologist of Japan. He declares that the bacillus of the plague which develops in all patients and ravages the interior organs, is distinct from any ever known before. It resembles in some degree the bacillus of cholera, but differs from it in many particulars. The bacillus consists of slender, short, straight filaments.

Kitasato has these bacilli and inoculated several animals with the virus. Every animal developed plague symptoms and died. The experiments showed clearly the bacilli were generally in filth and that patients who led clean lives recovered. One doctor wore clothes of an infected patient, but escaped the disease.

Kitasato and his associate, Prof. Aoyama, are experimenting with bactericides which may expel this deadly bacillus from the human system, as if it once secures firm lodgment the patient is doomed. The doctors agree that the Hong Kong plague is identical with the great plague of London and with the Astrakhan plague of five years ago.
