

Dodgers Down St. Louis; Yankees Lengthen Lead

Milwaukee's injury-riddled Braves nailed a one-game lead in the National League Thursday night, knocking off Philadelphia 4-2 after Brooklyn Dodgers scored an unearned run in the 11th to plunk St. Louis Cardinals out of first place with a 10-9 afternoon decision—following a fantastic ninth inning in which the two clubs scored 12 runs.

The Phils dropped to fourth with their third consecutive loss since taking first place Monday night. Brooklyn moved to third, 1½ games behind Milwaukee and five points shy of the second-place Cards.

Fifth-place Cincinnati, two games back, rapped New York Giants 2-1 on Gus Bell's two-run homer. And Pittsburgh scored four in the ninth to trim Chicago Cubs 6-5.

The Braves, gaining first place for the fourth time this season with a three-game sweep of the Phils, were without Hank Aaron, the league batting leader, for this one. He suffered an ankle injury Wednesday night and joined Billy Branton, Del Crandall, Felix Mantilla and Joe Adcock on the injured list. Second baseman Red Schoendienst, who started three of the Braves' four doubleplays, shifted to centre field in the patched up Milwaukee lineup for the last two innings. He last played the outfield in 1947 with St. Louis.

In the American League, New York Yankees moved into a five-game lead, their best bulge of the season, with a comeback 3-2 victory at Detroit after Baltimore had scored five in the ninth to beat the second-place Chicago White Sox 6-2.

Ted Williams' RBI triple proved the winner as Boston defeated Kansas City 3-1, and Camilo Pascual gave Cleveland only three singles as Washington defeated the Indians 4-0.

The beetle ninth at Brooklyn opened with the Dodgers leading 4-2, but the Cardinals then rapped across seven runs, with Eddie Kasko belting a two-run double and Del Ennis hitting a two-run triple, for a 9-4 lead. The Brooks hustled back with Gil Hodges' 12th lifetime grand slammer, tying the NL record held by Ralph Kiner and Rogers Hornsby, capping a five-run spurt that tied it.

Duke Snider, who blasted his 21st homer in the third, doubled and scored the winning run in the 11th on Kasko's error.

Bell, who also had two singles, swatted his ninth homer after a walk in the third in the third, Johnny Klippstein won it, but needed relief from Raul Sanchez after giving up a lead off homer to Bobby Thomson and a single to Ed Sherron in the ninth. Sanchez turned Ossie Virzili's pinch hit into a doubleplay and then got pinch-hitter Hank Sauer on a foul pop.

The Yankees were shut out on two hits for seven innings before getting to Billy Hoelt for three runs in the eighth. Hank Bauer drove one out. Mickey Mantle walked and Yogi Berra singled for the first run. Al Cicotte won it in relief, but Bob Grim had to get Red Wilson on a pop up, Dave Philley on an infield liner and Harvey Kuenn on a called third strike after the Tigers put runners on third and second with none out.

Jack Harshman had three—hit the Orioles for eight innings before they opened up for their five-three in their unearned-in-the-ninth. George Kell's sacrifice fly scored the tying run and Billy O'Dell and relief winner George Zvernik, including Walt Dropp's two-run homer in the third.

Tom Brewer won his 11th for the Red Sox, who scored two unearned runs off starter-loser Tom Gorman and reliever Tom Morgan. Williams' payoff three—bagger came in the third. It was his only hit in three trips, but left his league-leading bat average at .367. Mantle, the runnerup, was a 1-for-2 at Detroit for .357.

Pascual, now 7-10, walked six and struck out six while giving up two of the Tribe hits to Russ Nixon. Gene Woodling got the other single off the young right-hander, who had a six-inning no-hitter. The Nats scored an un-

MONTREAL (CP)—Everybody—the captains, the players and the officials—was happy about the draw Thursday for the singles matches today of the Canada-Brazil first round Davis Cup tennis tie.

The draw pits Canada's top player, 25-year-old Bob Beard of Sherbrooke, Que., against Brazilian rookie Carlos Fernandez, 19, in the first singles match. Don Fontana, 26, of Toronto, goes against Brazil's veteran playing captain Armando Vieira, 32, in the second.

In Sunday's closing singles, the opponents will be reversed and Beard will play Vieira in the final game.

Left in reserve were 25-year-old Paul Willey of Vancouver and Brazil's Jose Aguiero, 24, the United States intercollegiate champion of 1955. Vieira side-tracked Aguiero completely by naming himself and Fernandez to play Saturday's doubles also, but that decision can be changed up to an hour before the match.
