Twelve-year-old Kostya Slavin of Soviet Azerbaijan has finished secondary school with honors and passed his entrance examination in

physics to become a first year student at the Azerbaijan Medical Institute.

Slavin collects stamps and books on genetic engineering and studies Japanese in his spare time.
