Discuss Demand For Immigrant Workers On Farms

OTTAWA, (CP) - Canada will have about the same demand for farm-worker immigrants in 1954 as this year, provincial spokesmen Thursday told the 11th annual federal-provincial farm labor conference. Around 16,000 farm workers will have been admitted during the current year, it was estimated. All provinces indicated they will absorb about the same numbers as last year, though Alberta's representative told the conference it doesn't want any more unmarried German immigrants unless the quality of the newcomers can be improved. For the second straight day at the conference, heavy emphasis was laid on the unsuitability of many of the farm immigrants from Germany, now Canada's largest pool of agricultural labor. Several recommendations for meeting the problem were advanced, but none met with general approval from the experts conferring to lay out Canada's farm labor program for the next year. As provincial farm labor directors outlined it, Germans in large numbers have been jumping the agreements under which they contract to work on farms for year after coming to Canada. Also, many representing themselves as farmers had proven to be without previous farm experience.

Man, Secretary Missing 22 Years Found
ORANGE, Tex., (AP) - With a scowl in her voice, the secretary who disappeared 22 years ago with her boss, said "We're happy don't ask us any more questions now, please." Then she closed the door of the frame house in Orange where the couple known as Mr. and Mrs. Thomas D. Palmer live with four of their six children. For a while Thursday morning they talked. They admitted they were Thomas C. Buntin, member of a socially prominent family in Nashville, Tenn., and his secretary, Betty McCuddy of Russellville, Ky. Buntin was 26 when he disappeared and he left a wife, now remarried, and three sons. His secretary was 22. For 22 years they have lived in Texas and raised their family. They have one grandchild now and another expected any moment. The Nashville Tennessean had published the news of their life in a copyrighted story. The Tennessean's reporter, John Seigensthaler, talked to them Wednesday in Beaumont, where both work.

Money Meant Nothing

"We were in love. Money didn't mean too much to us. If money had meant anything, we wouldn't have done what we did," the former secretary told Seigensthaler. The Tennessean started the search 19 days ago after a hint came from a Chattanooga lawyer for the New York Life Insurance Co., which announced on Nov. 6 that it had found Buntin alive. The company got an injunction tying up part of the \$50,000 paid on Buntin's insurance policy when he was declared legally dead 15 years ago. There is that legal question. There are countless others. Betty McCuddy has been declared legally dead, too. Her share of a \$1,000,000 inheritance from a great-uncle was awarded in 1937 to her nephew, Robert F. McCuddy, a freshman at Duke University.
