The Welshmen battled league leading Rogers Rangers to an 8-8 stalemate in league action last Thursday night, and they should give the Red and White team quite a battle. The Saints have a small but fast skating club that moves the puck well. We feel the Red and White will prove to be the team to beat for the squad that hopes to land the championship and the Cudmore Dry Cleaner trophy which is emblematic of the feat.

Fate Of Scouting System Hangs In Rest Of Meeting

MONTREAL (CP) — Talent scout J. I. Albrecht said Monday the fate of his scheme for a central scouting system hangs in the balance of the Canadian Football League meetings in Ottawa this week. Albrecht said he made the league an "exclusive offer" of the scouting plan at the CFL's recent meetings in Chicago, and said the initial response was hopeful.

He said he offered to sell the service of the Canadian league which would buy it for a set fee on behalf of all nine teams in the circuit.

"All of the teams reacted favorably except one," said Albrecht, declining to say more.

"If the Canadian league turns the plan down as a body, then we'll approach each individual team," he said. Although rejection by the CFL wouldn't be fatal, Albrecht said it would be a serious setback.

Albrecht resigned last fall as general manager of the Quebec Rifles to devote full time to his "pet project" of selling the central scouting idea to the United Football League franchise was transferred last weekend to Toronto where the team will play in the new Continental Football League.

Albrecht unveiled his proposal at the Chicago meetings in a six-page brief, and met with league general managers later for a half hour.

The league was expected to rule on the scheme at this week's Ottawa talks.

"Our organization is now set up and in operation," Albrecht said in an interview. "In other words, we are established. All we need are customers."

Basically, the network would provide an information service on young, promising football talent in 88 United States colleges. Albrecht's field staff are the coaches of the U.S. colleges who have "already allied themselves with the network."

Albrecht says the system will save teams "time, money and wasted motion" and would "supplant, not replace, the teams' present scouting systems."

Also, the network would screen minor league circuits and provide information of training camp player cuts in the National and American football leagues.

Jim Fox, City recreation director, announced yesterday that arrangements have been made for the showing of the film at the following times: 4:00 p.m. this afternoon, at Queen Charlotte High School; 7:30 this evening, at Prince of Wales College and 4:00 p.m. at Birchwood High on Wednesday.

Mr. Fox said that the afternoon showings are for the elementary players and coaches while the evening session is intended for the player and coaches of the older hoop squads.

This film was obtained from Chicago by the staff of Acadia University and is an excellent guide to both players and coaches in the fundamentals of basketball. All interested persons are invited to attend the showing of the film.
