Financiers Would Corner Atlantic Air Lines

(By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, June 10.—An attempt to corner the North Atlantic air lines was charged tonight against a "group of international financiers" in a letter sent to the air ministry by C. H. Clendinning, chairman of the Irish Transatlantic Corporation. The letter criticized the government's decision to support the projected route planned jointly by Imperial and Pan-American Airways. Protesting the "non-consideration" of his company's plans for a Transatlantic service between London, Ireland, and Sydney, N. S., Clendinning wrote: "I fully appreciate, however, that the proposed Sydney-London route would seriously jeopardize the arrangements of a group of international financiers who plan to corner the North Atlantic air route for the benefit of companies whose shares they propose to operate on the New York and London stock exchanges."

The support the air ministry is giving vested interests who wished to exploit Newfoundland, as opposed to the rights of the Dominion of Canada, may have far-reaching effects. Clendinning's letter reviewed his company's efforts to promote the Sydney-London route. He referred Viscount Swinton, Secretary of State for Air, to resolutions recently adopted by the Sydney Council and Board of Trade urging the governments of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island to unite in opposition to the plan submitted to the Dominion government by the British Air Ministry.

Tot Swallows Open Safety Pin

By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, June 9.—An open safety pin swallowed by one-year-old Joseph MacDonald last Saturday was standing upright in his stomach today and causing no immediate concern, physicians attending the tiny patient said. The obstacle was not interfering with Joseph's digestion and he was resting easily. The pin was in a favorable position at present and doctors decided not to operate until stomach organs moved it. It was hoped the movements might be such that an operation would not be necessary.

N.S. Schooner Lost Off Nfld.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LUNenburg, N. S., June 9.—Loss of the fishing schooner Bruce and Winona at Burin, Nfld., was reported to her owners here today. The schooner was bound into the Newfoundland port for bait when she struck a rock in fog. The entire crew before the schooner tore herself off the rock and sank in deep water. Captain Arnold Parks advised his ship's owners. Owned by Adams and Knickle here, the schooner had been fishing on the Grand Banks.

Conversion Loan Well Received

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 9.—Subscription books for the 1936 conversion loan which opened June 3 were closed at six o'clock tonight and Finance Minister Dunning said the exchange of \$118,000,000 worth of bonds out of a possible \$187,000,000 exceeded his expectations. There will be a slight increase in the total conversions registered at six o'clock when all the scattered subscriptions are received. In addition to the conversions there was a cash sale of \$20,000,000 which was fully subscribed within two hours after the books opened last Wednesday morning.

Lots of Gossip at Geneva Conference

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, June 10.—Geneva is the most gossipy place in creation—dangerously gossipy in view of the great political issues centreing there. Miss Winifred Kydd, C.B.E., Montreal, President of the National Council of Women, said in addressing a local social club here. Retiring president of the women's convention which is in session in Halifax this week, Miss Kydd gave some of her impressions as a delegate to the League Assembly in 1932 and 1935. Miss Kydd was high in her praise for Sir Samuel Hoare, Dr. Edouard Benes, President of Czechoslovakia who was President of the League Assembly last year; Baron Pompeo Aloisi, leader of the Italian delegation; and Teckle Hawariate, Ethiopian representative. Despite the "many things said and written about him," Sir Samuel would take a high place in history, the speaker predicted, referring to him as that "much maligned gentleman."

Children's Aid Society Board Hold Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society of Prince County was held in the Town Hall Tuesday evening.

The Agent and Trust Officer, Mr. V. J. Harrington, in his report stated that he had three persistent truants during the past month and they were very small boys ranging in age from 8 to 10 years and despite all the parents could do and the punishments given by the Principal the boys still persisted in running away from school. He also reported that some small boys had taken money from milk bottles but their parents made good the amount and the boys were let off with a warning. There was also a case which he reported to the Society of a father earning good wages refusing to provide suitable clothes to send his boy to school, and the matter will be taken up by the Officer before the Magistrate.

The Society has been during the past winter purchasing clothing in needy cases in order to keep children in school. The Treasurer reported that the funds of the Society had become so depleted that unless some contributions were received that this practice would have to be discontinued in future.—S
