## Boer War Veteran Buried On Saturday

One of the last of the veterans of this province who served in South Africa in the Boer War, Lorne Stewart, died last Thursday.

A son of the late Lt. Col. and Mrs. Daniel Stewart, he spent most of his life in Winnipeg where he was employed as a salesman and later as a security guard with the Canadian Corps of Commissionaires.

He served in South Africa as a sergeant and won his commission there being discharged with the rank of lieutenant.

Mrs. Stewart, the former Nell Henderson survives him. Their only son, John, lost his life in World War II, being a member of the crew of HMCS Athabaskan, which was sunk off the coast of Britain in 1944.

His three brothers and two sisters also predeceased him.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon from the MacLean Funeral Home by Rev. Malcolm MacCuaig with interment in People's cemetery.

Attending in his official capacity was Brig. G.G.K. Peake, commandant of the Corps of Commissionaires, and Sgt. P.F. MacMurrer. The pallbearers were all Commissionaires: G.K. Wignome, G.D. McCullum, E.T. Williams, E.R. White, A.C. MacEachern and Arthur Dalziel.

## Car Shortage Critical, Premier Sends Telegram

Premier Alex Campbell sent a telegram to Transport Minister Pickersgill and CN President Donald, Gordon Saturday morning, in conjunction with the shortage of refrigerator cars, at the disposal of provincial potato shippers who fear a loss of valuable markets, due to a shortage of the cars.

The telegram said that 200 reefers are needed immediately to take care of the outstanding orders and the premier urged that prompt attention be given to the request.

The premier said he has already had meetings with CN officials from Moncton and his government is "keeping in close daily contact with the situation."

The premier added "we are very concerned that the car shortage will seriously affect our vital potato industry."

**PREDICTIONS FLOP**  
Most pre-vote forecasts had predicted Strauss would get his wings clipped in the state voting.

Bavarian Minister President Alfons Goppel, virtually certain to keep his post in the new government, said he was shocked by the NPD showing.

Strauss, who had stepped up the CSU's appeal to the ultra-Conservative vote with some strongly nationalist campaigning, commented:

"The results (for the NPD) are an answer to all those who have tried to pull Germany through the dirt."

The NPD has called for foreign troops to leave German soil and for German armed forces to leave the Atlantic Alliance and be placed solely under German control.

Although NPD leaders deny any tie with Hitler's old party, a recent government investigation said the NPD's 18-member steering committee, set up at the founding convention two years ago, included 10 former Nazis.

he owned a rifle. The Warren report quotes him as saying: "I have my own views on the president's national policy. Because of the charges I do not think I should comment further."

That was on Nov. 23. The following day, Oswald was shot by Jack Ruby, operator of a Dallas night club.

...Was there a conspiracy in which Oswald had accomplices?

Wesley J. Liebier, a Warren commission lawyer and now professor of law at the University of California at Los Angeles, said in a recent TV panel discussion: "As far as development of evidence of conspiracy... I think the only thing you can conclude is... some kind of indication would have come out at some place along the line."

This question leads to another. ...Did all the shots come... from the Texas school book... depository building where... Oswald was seen minutes... after the shooting?

## ARCHIVES GETS X-RAYS

The Kennedy family turned over to the National Archives Nov. 2 the 14 x-rays, 25 black-and-white negatives and 25 color transparencies taken of the autopsy.

Under conditions laid down by the family, non-official access to them will not be granted without the consent of the family for the next five years.

...What about the capability of the Mannlicher-Carcano rifle which the commission found to be the death weapon?

It had been called "crudely-made, poorly-designed, dangerous and inaccurate." The Warren report said: "The various tests showed that the Mannlicher-Carcano was an accurate rifle."

...Did Oswald have time to... get off three shots at the... moving Kennedy motorcade?

Referring to tests of the rifle, the commission said: "All three of the firers in these tests were able to fire the rounds within the time period which would have been available to the assassin under those conditions."

Questions raised by the critics go on and on. In a sense, they all relate to a central question: Did the Warren commission do a thorough and adequate job?

## Nixon Heads Ont. Liberals

TORONTO (CP) - Robert Nixon has been elected house leader of the Ontario Liberal party but said he has "no plans" at this time to run for provincial leadership.

Mr. Nixon, 38, rated as one of the two chief contenders for the leadership vacated Wednesday by Andrew Thompson, was elected at a party caucus attended by 19 of the 22 Liberal members in the legislature.

The other apparent early favorite - Charles Templeton, 51-year-old Toronto broadcasting personality - said Thursday he has not reached a decision but is "looking very seriously at the situation." He ran second to Mr. Thompson at the 1964 leadership convention. Mr. Templeton has never sat in the legislature.
