Altogether, about two hundred and thirty children received Communion yesterday. The Mass of Thanks giving after Communion was said by Rev. P. A. McElmeel.

THE PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY CONCERT.—On Tuesday evening and Thursday afternoon very successful practices for "The Creation" were held by the Philharmonic Society, and it is hoped that the Oratorio will be very satisfactorily rendered at the approaching concert. Most of the choruses of this Oratorio possess elements of powerful grandeur, which are perfectly soul-stirring, when effectually rendered by a large number of voices.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, William Duder was convicted of a first offence against the C. T. Act and fined \$50 or one month's imprisonment. Two other scott Act cases were dismissed, and three adjourned. One drunk was fined \$2 or eight days. Norman Valley, an old offender, was given six months imprisonment with hard labor for the larceny of a quantity of provisions from a countryman.

WINDOW BREAKING.—Two men had a squabble on Queen Street this forenoon, and one threw a stone at the other. Instead, however, of hitting the object aimed at, the stone went through one of the large plate glass panes in the window of Messrs. E. H. Norton & Co's store. The police were notified, but when they arrived the man was not to be seen.

THE PULPIT AND THE STAGE.—A sensation has been created throughout the South, says a San Antonio, Tex., despatch, by the announcement of the Rev. Virgil Maxey, a noted revivalist and Baptist minister, that he will go on the stage on September 1st. Maxey states that his object is to unite the pulpit and the stage. He will be on the stage six days in the week, and preach on Sunday. He is a nephew of ex-United States Senator Maxey.

The parlors, reception room, dining room and bedrooms have all been fitted up and furnished through out in excellent style. All the furniture is new and was made to order. The carpet used in the parlors, etc., as well as in almost all the bedrooms, is Brussels of a very pretty pattern. In short, all the appointments are first-class, and amply sufficient for the most fastidious. We sincerely trust that Mr. Archibald's enterprise will meet with the success it deserves.

ATTEMPTED INCENDIARISM.—During last night a deliberate and dastardly attempt was made to burn down the Brown Block, South Side Queen Square. Kerosene oil was poured under the rear door of Mr. G. H. Hazard's bookstore and on the lower steps of the stairway leading down from the first floor past this door and out into the yard. A match was applied to this "doctored" portion, but the fire did not last long enough to have the effect desired. The only damage done was a slight burning of the door casing at the foot of the stairway. A burnt match was found on the floor at the bottom of the stairs, this morning, and the rear door was open when Mr. Hazard's clerk arrived about half-past seven. The impression is that the incendiary entered through the front door, made his way up to the first flat, thence down the rear stairway to the scene of his operations and out the back door. There is no clue to the identity of the scoundrel. We trust, however, that every effort will be made to bring him to justice.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. ONTARIO. Mowat Sustained—Returns Incomplete.

MONTREAL, June 5. The results of the Ontario provincial elections will not be completed to-night. A careful estimate indicates that the Mowat Government will be returned by fifty-six to thirty-six. The last house stood fifty-nine to thirty-three. Four equal righters were elected.

Two Terrible Accidents. PHILADELPHIA, June 6. An explosion this afternoon, on the German tank steamer Hans and Kent, lying at the works of the Atlantic Oil Conveying Co., Point Breeze, Delaware River, set fire to the vessel and wharf property, almost destroying the former and burning the brick storage building. The steamer was towed down river and run ashore, and was practically burned out. She will have to be re-built. Four men were fatally and a dozen others more or less seriously burned by the flying oil. The loss on the steamer and cargo is estimated at \$15,000; on the Atlantic Oil Refining Company's storage building \$5,000.

No cause for the explosion is known. PHILADELPHIA, June 5. A report has reached here of a wreck on the Ohio River railroad between here and Parkersburg. A special of two cars filled with Baltimore and Ohio officials, en route to Wheeling, went through the trestle. A special train with surgeons and Associated Press reporters has left for the scene.

Halifax Notes. HALIFAX, June 5. P. McLarren, general agent of the Canada Life Insurance Co., narrowly escaped being killed to-day. He attempted to stop a runaway horse and tram (carriage), and was knocked down, trampled upon, and the wheels passed over his body. He was also kicked on the head and had one rib broken. Rev. Robert Laing was presented with \$500 on the occasion of his resigning the pastorate of St. Matthew's Church.

The five year old daughter of police officer Sullivan died to-day. The shock to her mother was so great that she died a few hours later. Immense quantities of large fat herring are reported along the coast and are being followed by schools of mackerel. Bankers and seiners would scoop in fortunes if they were on the track of these fish just now.

Heavy Embezzlement. BRIDGEPORT, Conn., June 5. Several months ago, LeGrand G. Beers, a young lawyer, doing business in New York, visited his home and secured a large amount of money from his brother and sister. Two wealthy neighbors, the proprietor of the Church Record, Southport, and others represented that he would invest it in mortgages in Brooklyn, paying large dividends. It is expected that his embezzlements will reach nearly \$80,000. It is thought he has gone to Canada.

Strike of Shoemakers. HAVERHILL, Mass., June 5. Two hundred operatives employed in the shoe factory of J. H. Winchell & Co. came out on strike at six o'clock to-night, by order of the boot and shoe workers' international union. The grievances alleged were refusal of the firm to adopt the union card system in the cutting room, and pay standard prices to all cutters employed, as agreed upon with the union about a month ago.

Arbitration. WASHINGTON, June 5. The Secretary of State has received a despatch from the U. S. Legation at Rio de Janeiro announcing that the cabinet had passed a resolution, enthusiastically approving of the action of the International American Congress, in recommending arbitration in all questions involving differences between the several governments of America.

Trouble With Indians. MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 5. A special to the Evening Wisconsin, from Shawano, (Wis.) says that 1500 Indians, armed with Winchester rifles on the Monominee Reservation, have driven the Indian agent off, and trouble is feared.

Baseball. ST. JOHN, N. B., June 5. The baseball game here to-day between the St. Johns and Monctons resulted in a victory for the former by a score of 4 to 3.

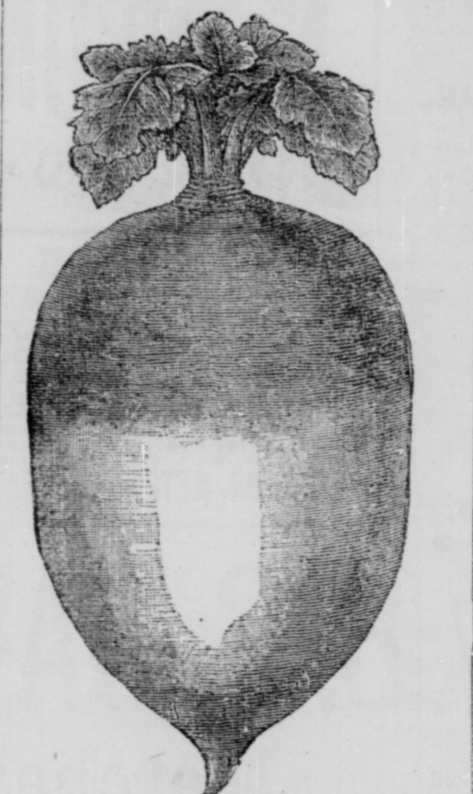

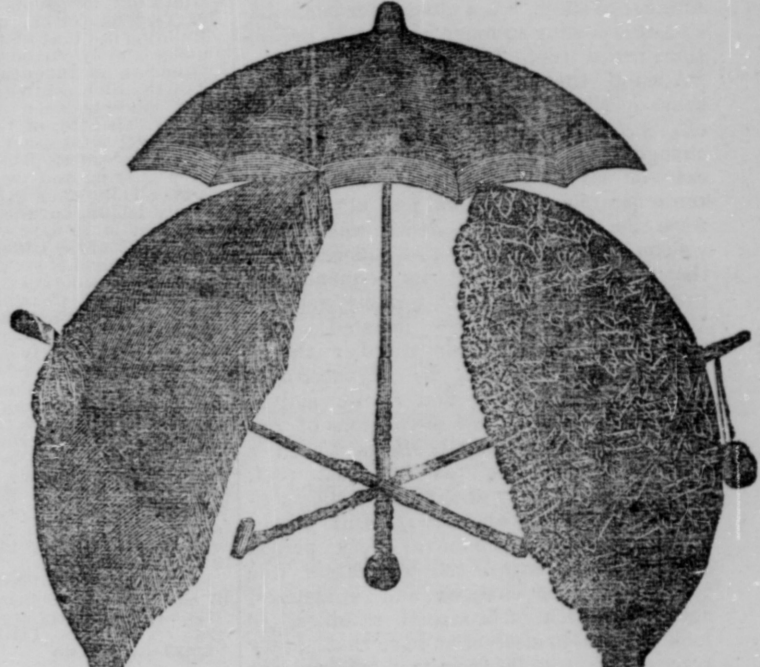
