Boat Building At Georgetown

At his modern and well equipped boat building shop in Georgetown, Mr. Marcellus G. Tell is building a new lobster fishing boat for his own use.

On Thursday, April 2nd, the builder had just finished planking the boat, a task which he performed all alone and completed in ten days.

This beautiful boat, which will be christened the Mary Paula, after one of the builder's little daughters, is twenty-eight feet, six inches in length, with a keel length of twenty-three feet and will have a shallow draft of eight inches forward and twenty inches aft, which Mr. G. Tell informed the writer will allow for easy maneuvering in shallow water, when it is desirable to use the boat handy shore.

She is built of strip planking of New Brunswick seasoned 1 1/2 inch spruce, of which two thousand running feet was used in the planking. The keel is of Island seasoned yellow birch. She will have ninety timbers, forty-five to a side and quite a history is attached to the lumber being used for the timbers. It was procured from the butt of an elm tree, which had to be removed from the Church of England grounds at Georgetown and, as the church is at least one hundred and twenty-five years old, the tree was at least that old and possibly older.

When completed the boat will be painted French grey, with green waterline and will be powered by a 1 1/2 H. P. Imperial Marine engine. Five weeks' work from the time of laying the keel will complete the job. It is noteworthy of mention that Mr. G. Tell designed the plans and made his own moulds.

In his workshop are several beautiful boat models, including one of a thirty-eight foot cabin cruiser, designed by Mr. G. Tell. Marcellus is well known as a seaman and for many years sailed the seven seas in Merchant Marine ships and during the last war he had the unforgettable experience of being a member of the crew of a ship torpedoed in the Atlantic. He is well known in the lobster fishing industry in the Province and is a vice-president of the Prince Edward Island Fishermen's Association.

All wish Marcellus every success with his new boat and who knows but what his efforts and fine workmanship may go a long way in reviving the once famous Georgetown industry of boat building.
