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CHARLOTTETOWN SCHOOL BOARD.

A special meeting of the School Board was held on Saturday, the 18th inst., at 3 o'clock.

The following teachers were appointed to fill the vacancies in West Kent St. School: Mr. John McLaughlin, Traveller's Rest; J. I. Owen, George's; Miss Monica Finlayson, Devon; and Miss Linda McLeod, Dunstaffnage.

The secretary was granted leave of absence for two weeks beginning on the 22nd inst. Persons having any business to do with the Board should call before that date.

In the senior forms, pupils are prepared for the church, army, law, medicine, engineering and other professions, and for commercial life. In the 1894 class four were successful in passing engineering matriculations, two won cadetships at the Royal Military College, two were appointed to bank clerkships, and others will compete for entrance to medical and other colleges in the fall.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. LONDON, Aug. 17.—John Morley, chief secretary for Ireland, in answering Justin McCarthy in the Commons today, said the government would reintroduce the evicted tenants' bills at the next parliamentary session.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—A report compiled by the board of agriculture on Canadian cattle is published. It announces that it is beyond question that a certain mark in the lungs, is the precursor of pleuro-pneumonia, which could not develop to the extent shown on slaughter in England unless it was contracted before leaving Canada. The board reminds the Canadian people and the government, if they wish the slaughter order rescinded they must take precaution in Canada.

BELEAST, AUG. 17.—The celebration of the Feast of the Assumption has been made the occasion for a series of riotous demonstrations in this city. The damage done to property up to yesterday was no more serious than the breaking of a few windows in various houses. Yesterday the trouble began in earnest and culminated in a serious riot. The disturbances were begun by a mob of nationalists, who attacked and beat a party of Protestants and then threatened to kill them.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Sir Edward Grey, parliamentary secretary to the foreign office, announced in the House of Commons this evening, in reply to a question, that negotiations have occurred for a revision of the Samoan treaty between Great Britain, Germany and the United States.

BELTIZ, August 17.—All yesterday the police made domiciliary searches of the strength of information obtained through the arrest of fourteen anarchists on Wednesday. The results are beyond all expectations. Many letters, pointing conclusively to intimate relations, if not cooperation, of Berlin and Paris anarchists, were seized and confiscated. Bombs loaded and ready for immediate use were found in the rooms of a widow named Werner. The police search will be continued.

LONDON, August 17.—During the last few days over four hundred anarchists have landed in this city. A special branch of the Scotland Yard police force is very busy watching over the new comers. The Scotland Yard men are assisted by a large staff of detectives from the different police divisions. Sir Edward Bradford, the chief commissioner of police, is personally directing the measures taken to watch over and render harmless the anarchists just landed. There is much excitement and great activity in anarchist circles here.

Replying to a correspondent, the New York Sun says "the original Irish color, so far as there was one, was blue. The ribbon of the order of St. Patrick is a key blue. The Irish brigadier at Fontenoy carried a blue flag showing a sunburst. Sir warrant, heraldic or other, for the green flag now generally considered as the Irish flag."

Despatches per Steamer Tacoma, announce the death of the King of Siam. H. M. S. Rattler has been despatched to Siamese waters to anticipate possible trouble over the succession. The deceased monarch, King Chulalongkorn I, was born September 21st, 1853; the eldest son of the late King Maha Mongkut, and of Queen Ramphu, succeeded to the throne at the death of his father, October 1, 1889. The royal sign is nominally hereditary, but does not descend always from the father to the eldest son, each sovereign being invested with the privilege of nominating his own successor.
