Milton Takes First Game Of "B" Series

The smooth-passing Milton Hornets took a four goal lead in the two game total goal series for the Queen's County Intermediate "B" championship as they trounced the powerful Parkdale Flyers 7-3 in a fast, hard-checking encounter at the Forum last evening.

The Hornets, who had an edge in play in all three periods, led 2-1 at the end of the opening, came from behind to gain a 3-3 lead in the middle frame and scored a pair of unanswered markers in a fairly listless finale. Referees Leith Jay and Brian MacCallum called a total of seven penalties in the fray, including majors to skip Carver of the Flyers and Gerry MacSwain of the Hornets for their brief flurry of fist-fights in the final period.

Fine defensive play by the Hornets' rear-guard, especially Bob MacKarris and Harley MacLean, and the outstanding goal-tending of Sheldon Jordan allowed the Milton pucksters to skate off with their healthy lead in the two-game series, which is expected to resume and be concluded at the North River Rink on Saturday evening. The winner of this set will advance into the inter-county playoffs with the Montague Primroses, representatives of King's County.

High-scoring rearguard, Harley MacLean, and forward Ralph Frizzell paced the Hornets to their win with a pair of goals each while Kelly had one goal and three assists, with MacSwain and Andrew collecting the other Milton singletons, Jimmy MacLeod, Willie and Allie Carver composed the trio of Flyer markers.

Kelly marked the scoring sheet for the first time in the game shortly after the half-way mark of the opening period, tripping Cruwys' short rebound by Don Simmons to give the Hornets a short-lived one goal lead. The Flyers, who had the edge in play in the first half of the session, stormed back less than a minute later with MacLeod and Trousdale going in on Jordan with only MacKarris back. The Milton team took over from this point to the end of the period and Ralph Frizzell scored his first goal of the night three minutes later as he combined on a play with Campbell, similar to the one which the Flyers had connected on only minutes before.

Again at the start of the second period the Flyers came out full of life and before the session passed the five minute mark they were leading the Hornets for the first time by a 3-2 margin on goals by Dunn and Allie Carver. In the latter half of the session, however, they faded again and MacSwain, Andrew and MacLean banded in singletons before the period ended.

The close-checking of the Hornets team kept the Parkdale forwards disorganized in the finale and the favored Flyers failed to revive as the Milton men collected a pair of unanswered counter-goals.

The New Glasgow Rangers, representatives of the APC Senior Hockey League, took their best of seven final series for the Nova Scotia senior hockey championship in four straight games as they dumped the Kentville Wildcats 6-2 in the New Glasgow Stadium last night. The Wildcats were the champs from Nova Scotia's South Shore Senior League.

In last night's game, the teams exchanged goals in the first period but the Rangers came strong in the middle session to collect three unanswered goals and take a commanding 4-1 lead. They out-scored the visitors 2-1 in the finale.

This was the third series that the Rangers have played and won, after running away with the APC League during the regular season of play. The New Glasgow men encountered their stiffest competition in the first series, the APC League semi-finals with the Saint Francis Xavier Collegians from Antigonish who forced them to eight games in a best of nine series. The Rangers took their

best of seven league finals with the Pictou Royals, who ousted the Halifax Wolves, in five games. Last night's win gives them the right to advance in the Maritime senior hockey finals with the winner of the present Moncton-Charlottetown series which the Hawks lead 1-0. It will continue in the Moncton Stadium this evening.

Find Things Are Not Like Home In German Rinks

By Arch MacKendzie Canadian Press Staff Writer DUESSELDORF, Germany, (CP) — Canadian sports writers covering the world hockey championships know they are away from home.

German rinks—as far as time clocks, score indicators, scoring systems and other factors are concerned—are a far cry from the modern, well-equipped North American variety.

None of the other 350 newspaper men from the 14 competing European countries seem to miss these mechanical aids. German officials are puzzled but accommodating about Canadian customs.

Penalties and goals are announced everywhere—in German. But the penalty-calling is not infallible and the terminology is different. Some translations, offered by kindly German reporters:

"Two minutes for unpermissible beating over the head with the stick." "Two minutes each for jostling without the puck." Canadian reporters boiled the

COLOGNE, Germany (CP) — Czechoslovakia, Switzerland and Germany won Tuesday in the fifth round of the world hockey tournament. Their victories had little to do with the standings, as Canada and Russia, the leaders, were idle.

Czechoslovakia, beaten by Canada and Russia, barely eked out a 6-5 victory over Sweden. Switzerland and Germany both won their first games of the tournament. The Swiss defeated Poland its third straight 4-2 and the Germans looted over Finland 7-1.

Playing at Cologne, the Swedes turned on everything they had and even pulled out their goalie for an extra forward in the closing minutes but the Czechs held on.

Slavomir Barton, star Czech forward, scored two goals in the final period. His final goal in the 18th minute proved the winner as the Swedes rallied for three goals themselves.

Both teams now have won two and lost two and are tied for fourth place. Canada and Russia, with 4-0 records, lead the pack and the United States also idle Tuesday, is third with a 3-1 mark. Germany, Poland and Switzerland follow, each with one win and three defeats. The Finns are last with four losses.

Today Canada's Penticon Vs meet Switzerland at Cologne; Sweden takes on Finland at Duesseeldorf; Czechoslovakia is paired against Germany, also at Duesseeldorf, and Russia clashes with the United States at Krefeld. The Canada-Switzerland match starts at 9 p.m. (2 p.m. EST).

Ottawa Team May Go To Russia Soon

OTTAWA (CP) — Negotiations are under way to send an Ottawa hockey team to Russia later this month.

T. P. (Tommy) Gorman, Ottawa sports promoter, said Tuesday negotiations are well advanced. He was waiting for confirmation from officials of the Russian embassy that the trip can be arranged.

The embassy official with whom Gorman has been talking was not available Tuesday for comment. Gorman said he began discussions some weeks ago with Russian embassy officials at the invitation of the Russian ambassador to Canada, Dmitri Chuvakhin.

Details have yet to be worked out. They will depend on the plans of the Moscow Dynamos, now defending their world hockey championship in Germany, Gorman said. The exhibition games would probably be against the Dynamos provided the Russian club returns directly from the world championships.

Before the Ottawa team could play in Russia, the trip would have to be approved by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the National Hockey League, which has options on most of the amateur players, he said.

If the negotiations are successful the team would probably leave Canada about March 20 or 22. The players likely would be selected from the Ottawa senior hockey league and clubs in the district.

Population 2.7 Per Cent Greater Than Year Ago

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's population totalled 15,435,000 Jan. 1, up 2.7 per cent from 15,035,000 the corresponding date last year, the bureau of statistics estimated Tuesday.

This gain of 404,000 for 1954 is numerically greater than the gains of 386,000 or 2.5 per cent for 1953 and 388,000 or 2.7 per cent for 1952.

The Jan. 1 figure is an increase of 29,000 over the Dec. 1, 1954, estimate of 15,410,000. The bureau also released final vital statistics figures for 1953. Births reached a record high of

416,825 and the birth rate of 28.2 per 1,000 population was seventh among the major countries of the world. There were 127,381 deaths, but the death rate of 8.6 per 1,000 population was the lowest on record. Previous low was in 1952 with a total of 125,950, and a rate of 8.7 per 1,000. Total population in 1953 was 14,756,000 compared with 14,465,000 in 1952.

The 1953 death rate was third lowest in the world. Only the Netherlands with 7.7 and Norway with 8.3 were lower.

The rate of natural increase or excess of births over deaths was 19.6 per 1,000 population, sixth highest in the world.

DUESSELDORF, Germany (CP) A 1656 European tour for Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens is being arranged. J. P. "Bunny" Ahearne, boss of the world hockey championships and president of the British Ice Hockey Association, said Tuesday he is willing to take up the matter with British and European rink managers.

The suggestion was put to him by Andy O'Brien of the Montreal Star, acting on behalf of the Montreal club. A similar tour by the National Hockey League clubs was suggested a year ago.

Ahearne said he will act should Montreal and Toronto decide to make the trip. Such a tour would follow the NHL season.

Russians Fairly Modest In Claims About Hockey

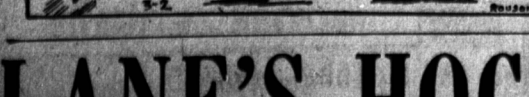
OTTAWA (CP) — Considering the invention claim by the Russians in many fields, they are fairly modest about hockey.

They don't say, for instance, that hockey was invented in Russia or even that this year's team will win the world championship when it meets Canada Sunday. Russia won the world title last year at Stockholm.

According to one V. Frolov in an article on hockey published in the Soviet news bulletin issued by the Russian embassy here: "The Soviet players think that they will be able to perform with success in these difficult contests."

ROCKEY POPULAR Elsewhere, Mr. Frolov says: "Ice hockey has been cultivated in the USSR only for the last few years. Despite the shortness of this period, ice hockey has acquired tremendous popularity in the Soviet Union. At the present time the books of the country's sports clubs include tens of thousands of hockey players."

He is less modest about Russia's performance last year than he is about this year's Russian chances of victory: "Noting the speed of the Soviet sportsmen, the Swedish coaches,
