DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

THE BUDGET

Sir Richard's Criticism.

OTTAWA, May 13. Sir Richard Cartwright resumed his criticism of the budget. He maintained that instead of an increase of wealth we had only a displacement of wealth. Turning to the railway returns, Sir Richard made an elaborate calculation to show the annual loss on the Intercolonial Railway and canals, taking into consideration the interest on the money expended. The whole future of this country had been staked in the Northwest with miserable and ridiculous results. He came out squarely in condemnation of railway subsidies by the Dominion and concluded, after a further calculation that every acre of cultivatable land in Ontario had already been mortgaged by Federal expenditure to the amount of \$50 per acre. At six o'clock Sir Richard closed what was probably the most dismal of all the dismal speeches which he has ever delivered; having occupied two and a half hours. After recess the House passed many items of the tariff. A charge was made in the item of floor oilcloth which was changed to five cents per yard and fifteen per cent.

EARTHQUAKE AGAIN.

APPALLING LOSS OF LIFE.

HERNOSILLE, Mex., May 13. A special officer from Ires (Sunday), with despatches, says that while the first reports after the first shock were exaggerated the loss of life is appalling. The towns of Arsepé and Opata were completely destroyed, and forty people are buried in the ruins. Other towns are greatly damaged. SAN FRANCISCO, May 13. Despatches report a slight earthquake at Eureka, Cala, Rhonesville, Cala, and Sanbuena Ventura. There was no damage. CHARLESTON, S. C., May 13. There was a slight shock of earthquake at Summersville and here last night. Monster Strike. CHICAGO, May 13. To-night all building operations under the control of contractors who are members of the Master Masons Association shut down so far as the bricklayers and stonemasons are concerned. It is estimated that fully ten thousand workmen are now idle in the building trade of the city, as a result of the strikes or lockout. The general shut down inaugurated this evening is the outgrowth of a series of strikes in the building trades, and is an attempt by the employers to force a battle royal with the workmen and secure lasting peace during the season. The Ocean King. SAN FRANCISCO, May 13. A despatch to the merchants exchange from Fort Townsend, W. T., states that all the crew of the Ocean King, which was burned and abandoned off the Oregon coast last Sunday, has arrived at that port. Parnell's Health. LONDON, May 13.
