He added, however, that the "air cadet program will be only as good as those who provide the leadership."

Mr. Vopni stated that the air cadet work involved a personal sacrifice but that this was rewarded through witnessing a cadet on parade, through the summer camps, through seeing a well-dressed cadet, and through watching a cadet develop into a healthy member of the nation.

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THE ANNUAL meeting of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Home and School Associations was held yesterday at the Provincial Vocational Institute. The meeting got under way in the afternoon and was highlighted by an address presented by Elinor MacDonald (CENTER) entitled "Are We Teaching Reading?"

Director Of Guidance Addresses Home, School

Elinor MacDonald, director of guidance for the Charlottetown Elementary Schools delivered the keynote address at the Provincial Home and School annual meeting held yesterday at the Vocational Institute.

Miss MacDonald spoke on the topic, "Are We Teaching Reading?"

The speaker opened her remarks by stating that "Everyone in the civilized area of the world, child, adolescent, or adult has a personal need for being an effective reader. Reading is the primary avenue to all knowledge. It offers access to the information, ideas, aspirations and happenings of both the past and the future. Through reading one extends his environment from home and community to the world as a whole," she stated.

DEFINITION "A complete definition of reading assumes that the reader first recognizes the printed or written symbol involving such skills as accuracy in recognizing the words, rate of reading etc. as well as a grasp of the meaning of the words presented. It also assumes that the reader reflect on the significance of the words and ideas and evaluate them critically," Miss MacDonald said.

She went on to say that fast moving change has plunged us into some of the most serious problems in the history of mankind and these problems are flinging out many new challenges to those of us engaged in the teaching of reading.

"The solution most frequently proposed for solving the problems that are currently plaguing humanity is education and reading is basic to education. The two major functions in teaching children to read are (1) developing in them skills which enable them to read efficiently and (2) cultivating within them a strong desire to read and an appreciation of worthwhile reading materials," she emphasized.

PRESENT LEVEL Miss MacDonald explained that instruction should begin at the learner's present level and attempt to lead him at his own rate to maximum achievement. "There is no better method of wasting time than teaching what is already known or teaching or trying to teach what the child is not ready to learn", the speaker emphasized.

not ready to learn", the speaker emphasized.

"A child should be involved in a program of preparation for reading for five or six years prior to school entrance she said. Miss MacDonald explained that "the child who has been prepared shows it by a willingness and eagerness to learn. It cannot be repeated too often that what we give the child in terms of happy and successful language experience in the home, he will be able to incorporate into wider and more useful experiences in school and later life."

"The development of a love for reading should be the prime purpose of a literature program. We've been more concerned with teaching children to read than with the development of children who do read. It is the task of teachers and parents to bring children together, she stressed.

Miss MacDonald closed her remarks by stating, "the book is a shield, a tool, a power pack. It is an instrument for intellectual and emotional navigation. It is man's own sovereign remedy against the ills and confusions of a changing universe. The more competent readers a society has, the greater will be its capacity for doing good to itself."

Cucumber Growers Presented Cheques

ALBERTON — Forty-five cucumber growers from the West Prince area were presented cheques for this year's crop at a meeting in Alberton last night.

Along with cheques special prizes were given to the four growers with the biggest yield per acre: John Barbour, Montrose, Robert Arseneault, Cascompec, Norman Warren, Montrose and Mrs. James Currie, Elmisdale. The largest grower, Mrs. Erskina Clark, Alberton also received a special prize for growing forty thousand pounds of cucumbers. The top yields ranged from 2 to 6 tons per acre.

The awards and cheques were presented by Guy Limoges, field operations manager for the Cattell Food Products Ltd. of Montreal, who gave a resume of his company's first experiment in growing cucumbers in Prince Edward Island. In all 131 acres were grown this year and the company hopes to expand to three hundred acres next year. After two more years a plant for the area would be considered depending entirely on the interest shown by the people in the area. This year's crop was of excellent quality Mr. Limoges said and we are very pleased with our experiment. Regarding future expansion he said "if you are willing to grow cucumbers we are willing to buy them."

Hon. Robert Campbell, minister in the provincial cabinet, congratulated those taking part in the industry and presented a cheque for \$6,995.98 to Mr. Limoges from the provincial government representing a subsidy on the cost of transporting this year's crop to the company's plant in Montreal.

The meeting in the United Church Hall was presided over by C.R. Leard, secretary treasurer of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade. Other speakers included Mayor Roy Leard, Andrew Wells, Prosper A. Arseneault M.L.A., Charles Thibert, fieldman for Cattell Products, Gerald Handrahan, vice president, West Prince Board of Trade and J. Frank Bryan. Following the meeting lunch was served.

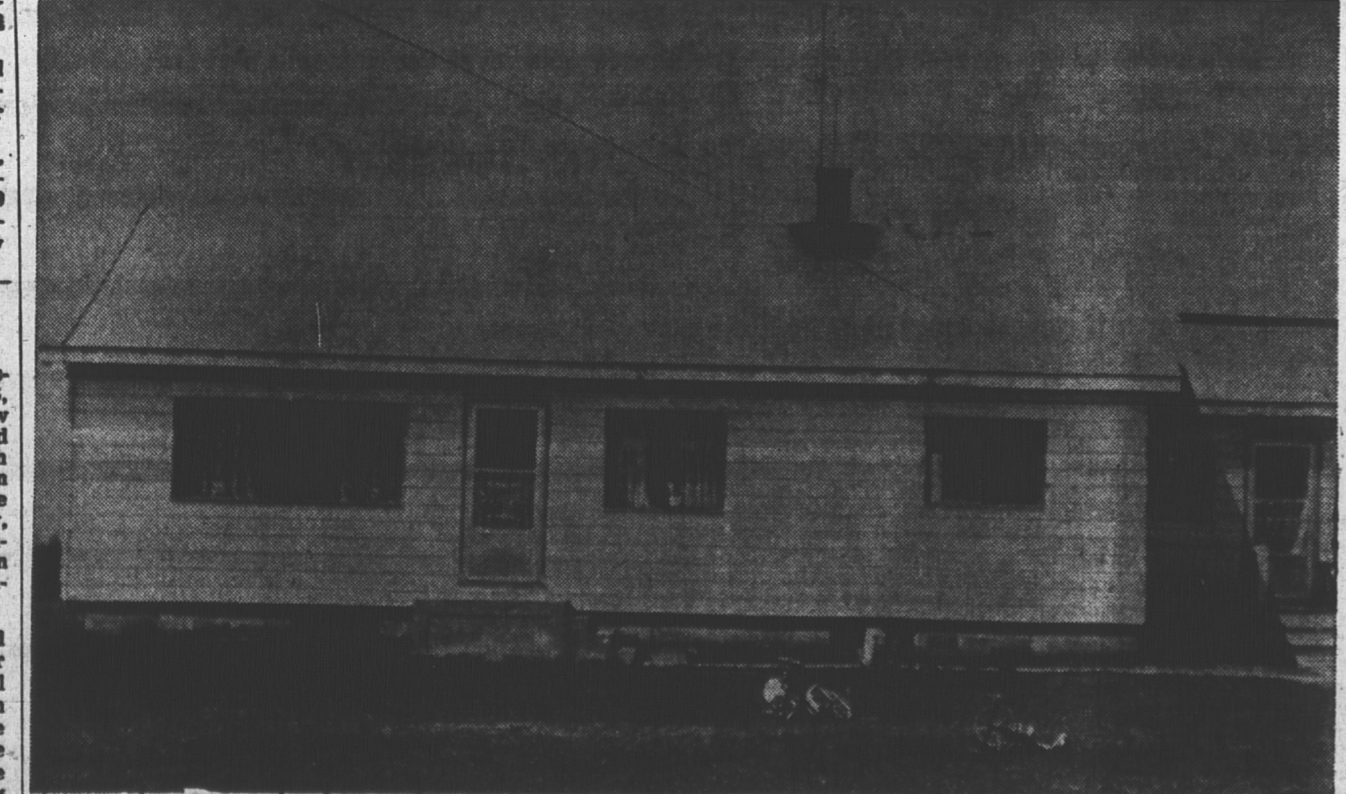
