

100,000 Persons Combine To Collect Election Data

TORONTO (CP) — Fast and complete coverage of Monday's election news will come through the combined effort of about 100,000 people scattered around every voting corner of Canada.

This army of mainly behind-the-scenes workers will assemble and collate the returns for The Canadian Press, the national news co-operative; and for the 103 daily newspapers in its membership, the 275 private stations served by its subsidiary Broadcast News, the CBC and the private television network CTV.

CP's staff of 300 works with those of its newspapers, Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Telecommunications, the private broadcasters and about 97,000 electoral officials to collect figures from the 263 constituencies, put them into news form and distribute them.

The process of vote-counting starts as soon as the polls close in Newfoundland at 7 p.m. local time.

START WITH TRICKLE

Starting with a trickle and steadily growing to a torrent, the returns will stream from the cities, rural areas and remote arctic polls to a special compiling staff at CP's head office in Toronto. A few flow of progressive reports will start a few minutes after the Newfoundland polls close. The general picture will be given in compact statistical detail at frequent intervals.

Returns may not be published in newspapers or broadcast in any province before the close of polls in that province. This complies with a 1936 Election Act amendment following claims that speedy CP reporting of 1955 federal election returns in the East affected voting in the West.

Chief organizer of the CP election report is Douglas Amaron, general news editor at head office and a veteran of CP service in Canada and as a war correspondent.

The writing team at CP's

election centre will be headed by Graham Trotter, assistant chief of bureau at Ottawa, and will include Dave McIntosh and Ben Ward of CP's parliamentary staff, who shared campaign coverage of the party leaders with seven other Ottawa and Quebec writers. McIntosh will write the main stories for Tuesday morning papers, and Ward for evening papers. John LeBlanc, of Toronto staff, will write the Ontario result.

COVER LEADERS

CP will have staff men on hand to cover what the leaders say and do election day and night. Stewart MacLeod with Prime Minister Pearson in Ottawa, Ken Clark with Conservative Leader Diefenbaker in Prince Albert, Sask.; Michael Gillan with T. C. Douglas' New Democratic Party, in Vancouver. Stuart Lake with Social Credit Leader Thompson at Red Deer, Alta., and Donat Valois with Christiane Leader Real Casquette at Rouyn, Que. Wire photo staff and transmitters have been assigned to all leaders.

The Ottawa parliamentary bureau under Fraser MacDougall will provide interpretative and other stories as developments warrant.

Regional coverage, the basis of CP's election-night service has been organized for the Atlantic provinces by Jack Brayley, Halifax bureau chief; for Quebec by Montreal chief William Stewart, for Ontario by Lloyd McDonald, chief of Ontario Service; for Manitoba by Winnipeg chief Fred Chafe; for Saskatchewan, Alberta and the Northwest Territories by Edmonton chief A. B. Garrett; and for British Columbia and the Yukon by Vancouver chief K. J. Methal.

member newspapers and carried on its 50,000 miles of leased teleprinter wires.

Closeness of the result will determine when a winner is known. CP's fastest decision on the national outcome was in the Progressive Conservative landslide of 1958—just 62 minutes after the close of polls in Ontario and Quebec. In 1963 CP reported only two hours 21 minutes after the Ontario-Quebec close that the Liberals would have the large group, and in 1964 that the Liberals had won but with a majority unlikely.

On election night in 1963, CP tabulated a record 97 per cent of the 7,894,000 votes cast.

Coverage on the outcome of the service vote—which will be added to Monday's civilian count later in the week—will be provided on the Saturday or Sunday after the election, depending when it is made public at Ottawa. In 1963 the service vote shifted one seat—Hastings South—from the Conservative to the Liberal column.

Turkish Cypriots Make Claim Threatened By Greek Group

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Turkey told the United Nations Security Council Friday that 10,000 Turkish-Cypriots are threatened with aggression by Greek-Cypriots in the port city of Famagusta. The Greek-Cypriot government countered that the facts do not bear out the charge.

The charge was levelled by Turkish Ambassador Orhan Eralp at an emergency meeting of the 11-nation council requested by Turkey to deal with new fighting between Greek- and Turkish-Cypriots in Famagusta.

Dispatches from Famagusta said heavy firing occurred Thursday night and scattered shooting Friday morning. Tension remained high, but there was no violence Friday night.

After Eralp spoke, U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg asked UN Secretary-General U Thant whether he had any late information on the situation in Cyprus.

ASK AID

GENEVA (Reuters) — The League of Red Cross Societies Thursday asked its 106 member societies for 95,000 Swiss francs (\$21,850) in cash and medical supplies to aid 50,000 refugees from Portuguese Guinea now camped in neighboring Senegal.

USING COMPUTERS

The CBC and CTV, which receive CP's report, also are collecting returns independently. Each is using a computer system to speed the totalling of votes and to spot trends.

CTV, with a dozen affiliates from St. John's, Nfld., to Vancouver, has had a crew of technicians feeding 50,000 political facts into the memory file of its Canadian General Electric computer for three months. Election-night figures will be added and the results go into another machine turning the findings into typed form that can be read by TV cameras.

The CBC has marshalled all its resources to bring "the fastest and most thorough returns possible." It will use more than \$1,000,000 worth of equipment set up by International Business Machines. IBM says trends indicated by the computer should be 95- to 97-per-cent accurate.

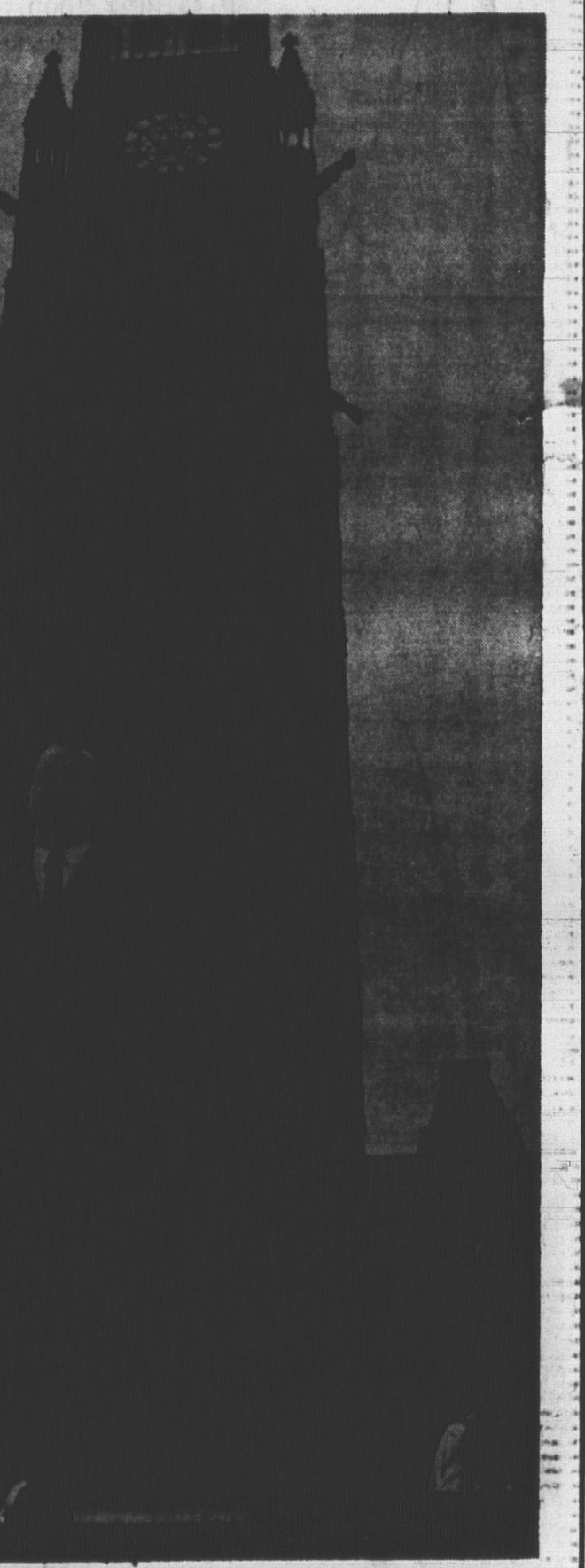
