SPAIN'S LOSS OF EMPIRE.

L. H. DAVIES. To this the following reply has been received:—

LONDON, Aug 6. Sir L. H. Davies, Charlottetown:—

Will go \$15,000 a trip for three or four trips. Be sure to secure steamer. Inform Parmslee, Ottawa, with whom I arranged before leaving.

S. FISHER. At a meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade held last evening the matter was referred to the steamship owners and their agents to take the necessary action.

Parade Last Evening, Followed by a Concert.

The O'Connell anniversary falling upon Saturday this year, it was decided to postpone the celebration until Monday evening, upon which occasion the Benevolent Irish Society and the Ancient Order of Hibernians would be joined by the Benevolent Irish Society of Emerald. The celebration came off as decided upon and proved most successful, notwithstanding the slight rain which began to fall shortly before six o'clock.

Every number on the programme was rendered in a manner that evidently met with the approval of the audience. The applause was generous, and in almost every instance an encore had to be acknowledged. The favorites of former concerts all did well, and the new performers made excellent impressions.

After the concert the visiting members of the Benevolent Irish Society and some other friends were entertained at luncheon in the Opera House, and an hour or two was pleasantly passed. At one o'clock this morning the visitors were escorted to the railway station by the local Irishmen and the League Band, and left for home well pleased with the manner in which they had been entertained.
