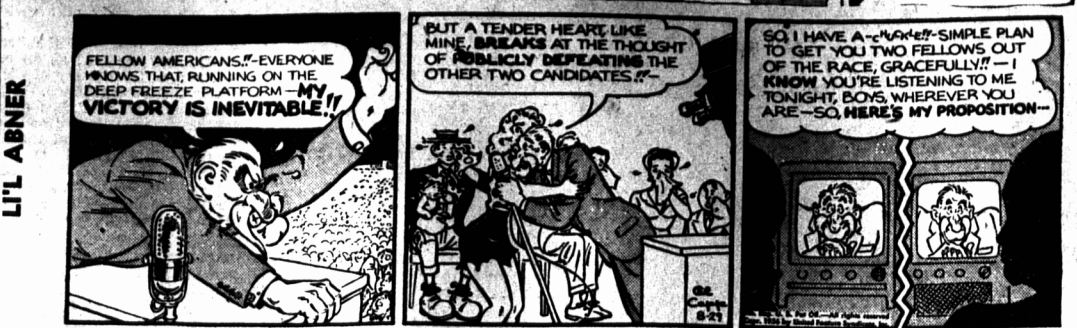

Opening lead—queen of spades.
The declarer is sometimes called upon to do what looks like the impossible. A familiar example of this, although the opportunity to make the play is not too frequent, is the Grand Coup. It consists of creating a finesse situation, where, in fact, the suit in which the finesse is being taken is not led. The anomalous situation is demonstrated in today's hand.

East appears to have an impenetrable trump trick because the declarer can finesse through East's king only twice instead of the desired three times. Nevertheless, South can crack through this barrier by judicious play and make all thirteen tricks.

The spade lead is won in dummy and the ten of trump successfully finessed. Another trump finesse declares that East started with K-7-5-3 of hearts. The trick is to do East out of his apparent trump winner, there being no more trumps in dummy to lead through his guarded king.

South plays a spade to the king and trumps a spade. This is part of a plan to reduce his trump holding to the same number East has—two.

Next he cashes the ace-queen of diamonds and plays a low club to the queen. He then trumps the ten of diamonds and is left with the ace-queen of trump and the ace-jack of clubs.

The jack of clubs to dummy's queen leaves East with the king-seven of trump and a club. The king of diamonds play puts East in a hopeless position. If he trumps, South overtrumps and makes the rest. If East, instead, discards a club, declarer discards the ace of clubs.

With the lead still in dummy and both East and South being down to two trumps, a lead from dummy compels East to trump and sacrifice the hitherto guarded king.

I know many players who would get a greater bang out of making the extra 30 point trick, insignificant as it is, than they would out of bidding and making the small slam. To them, it's art for art's sake.

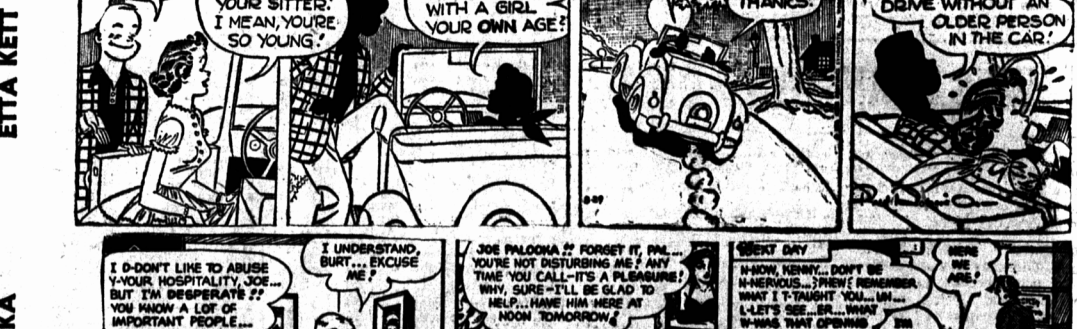

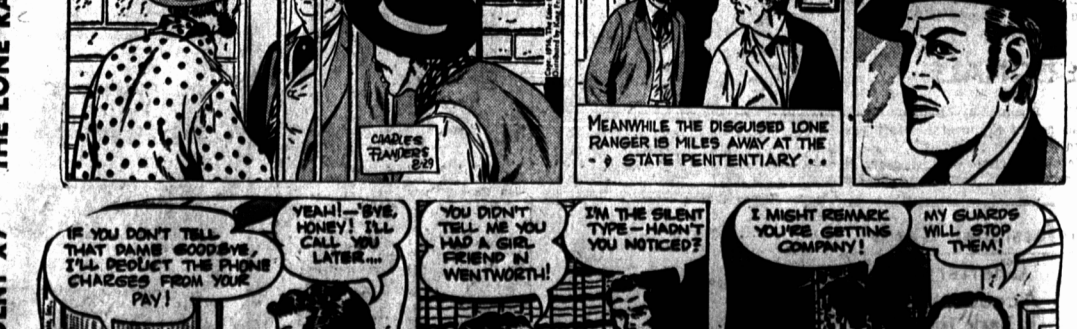
