## Hunter River Native Retires As U.S. Navy Rear Admiral

Climaxing a career in the United States armed forces which won him distinction in his chosen profession and recognition by a grateful nation, Captain William M. Silliphant, director, Armed Forces Institute of Pathology, was promoted to the rank of Rear Admiral, United States Navy, prior to his retirement recently.

In 1955 with the rank of captain, Rear Admiral Silliphant was nominated for the post he has occupied since that time, by the board of governors of the AFIP, composed of the Surgeons - General of the Army, Navy and Air Force. The Armed Forces Institute of Pathology serves as the central laboratory of pathology for all the armed services.

Rear Admiral Silliphant, who was formerly a resident of Hunter River received his early education at Prince of Wales College and for some years taught school in Prince Edward Island.

He emigrated to the United States in the early 20's and continued his studies there. His two sisters residing in P.E. Island are Mrs. J.W. Patterson, Hunter River and Mrs. Sherman MacDuff, Brookfield.

Rear Admiral Silliphant received his Bachelor of Arts De-

gree from the University of Southern California in 1926 and his medical degree from Stanford University Medical School in 1931. He was commissioned in the Medical Corps of the Navy in 1930.

At the termination of his first sea duty in 1933 he began post-graduate study in pathology and subsequently has served in many Naval hospitals.

While serving at the Naval Hospital, Canaco, Philippine Islands, he was captured and interned for 37 months by the Japanese.

He returned to the United States after the liberation in 1945 and served successively in many important Naval hospital positions on both the Pacific and Atlantic coasts. In the spring of 1953 he served as pathologist on a wound ballistics research team, being sent to the Far East for survey studies on Korean casualties.

Rear Admiral Silliphant has made an outstanding contribution to medical literature as a result of his studies and has been fittingly rewarded by recognition in many leading medical associations.

For distinguished service, while a prisoner of war, the Secretary of the Navy issued him the Navy letter of Commendation with commendation ribbon. He was also awarded the Army Distinguished Unit Badge, Philippine Defense 1941-42 and from the Philippine Government the ribbons of Philippine Defense, Philippine Liberation and Philippine Independence.

At this service the visitors of the Every Member Visitation were commissioned in a dedication service before beginning this portion of the sector plan which is being carried out by the churches of New London Parish, and Kensington United Church.

At the United Church the commissioning of the visitors was also part of the morning service, and the visitation was begun later in the day.

SUMMERSIDE — Dr. Charles P. Herndon, minister of the Charlottetown Church of Christ, has just concluded the first week of special services at the Church of Christ, Central Street, Summerside.

Each night the audience was inspired with the force and clarity with which Dr. Herndon dealt with some of the profound truths from the Holy Scripture, such as "Grace" and "Temptation" and "The Changeless Christ".

## Alberton Man Is Fined \$275

SUMMERSIDE — Conviction on two out of four charges arising out of offences committed under the Fisheries Act cost Alberton fisherman Cecil Hutt a total of \$275 when he appeared in county magistrate's court here Thursday.

Hutt was found guilty of failing to heave to and obstructing a fisheries officer and was fined \$25 and costs on the first charge and \$250 and costs on the second.

The other two charges that of having the unlawful possession of fish in a closed area and unlawfully throwing part of his cargo overboard after being given a signal to heave to from a fisheries patrol boat, were dismissed.

Similar charges against his brother, Lamont Hutt, were also dismissed when Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald noted that he was not in command of the boat at the time the offences were committed.

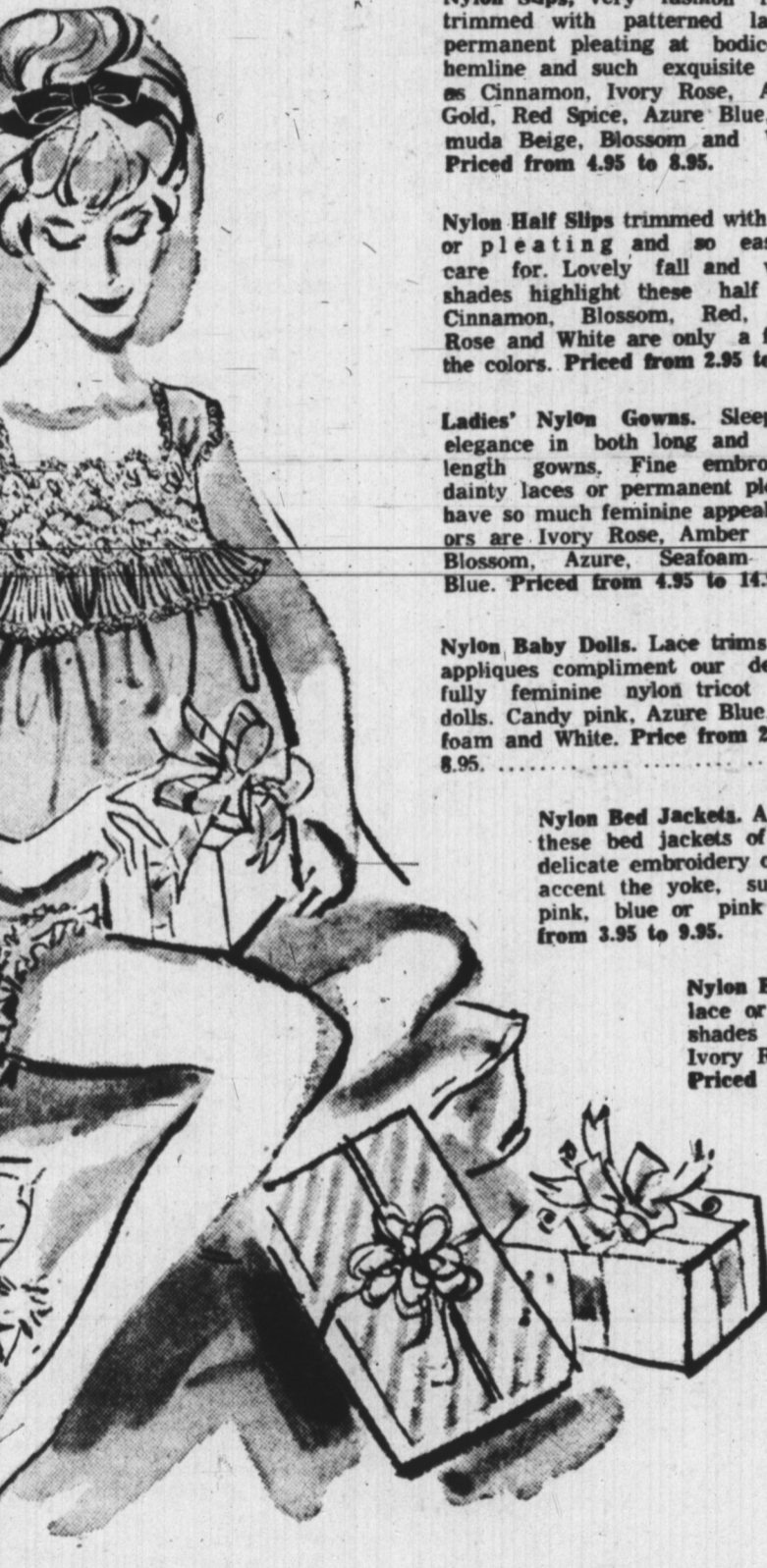
