

Further Marked Decline In Local Unemployment

From a winter peak of more than 4,200 unemployed people in Kings and Queens County, the total number has now dwindled to something over 1,400. These figures were compiled by the Charlottetown office of Thursday afternoon. Since then other unemployed workers have returned to employment and it is likely that the out-of-work ranks do not aggregate more than 1,350 or thereabouts. According to the local employment office officials, employment office officials these figures will continue their favourable downward trend in the next few weeks. The city's construction program practically guarantees full employment, for all local tradesmen and construction labourers.

The unemployment figures are deceptive in one respect. Under the recent fishing amendments, fishermen can continue to draw unemployment insurance benefits, but each week must declare their earnings. Most of them earn very good money and when it exceeds a certain amount they are unable to draw unemployment insurance. However, they are protected in any week, which, because of stormy weather, they are unable to fish at all. This means that many fishermen not employed, are still shown on the local employment office records as being unemployed. In any other year, no fishermen will be shown as unemployed at all.

This arrangement whereby fishermen can continue to draw benefits if their earnings are very small does not apply to those fishermen whose benefit rites have already expired.
