

## Bailey, Landy Crack Four Minute Mile At Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jim Bailey of Australia Saturday defeated his famed countryman, world champion miler John Landy, as they became the first runners to crack the four-minute mile on United States soil.

The astonished crowd of 40,000 saw the 26-year-old Bailey hit the finish line in 3:58.7, with Landy a stride back in 3:58.7.

The times shattered the American record of 4:00.5 set by Wes Santee at Austin, Tex., in 1955 but left intact the world record of 3:53 set by Landy in 1953.

Many in the crowd had turned out to see Landy's heralded U.S. debut.

**JOINS FIVE OTHERS**

All eyes were on Landy until Bailey whose best previous time was 4:05.6, caught him in the final lap and crossed the finish line in time to join the select group of five others who have shaded four minutes.

Well behind the celebrated pair, in third place at 4:05.6, was Ron Delaney, a 19-year-old sophomore at Villanova and a native of Dub-

## Dave Sime Shatters World Mark In 220-Yard Dash

DURHAM, N. C. (AP) — Muscular Dave Sime, a Duke University sophomore, Saturday shattered a world record when he covered the 220-yard low hurdles in 22.2 seconds.

Then he ran the 100-yard dash in 9.4, a tenth of a second off the world record, the 220-yard in 20.3 and placed second in the broad jump and third in the discus.

The 9.4 time for the 100-yard dash matched the performance he gave a week ago when he broke the 30-year-old record for that event at the Drake Relays in Des Moines.

Shutout pitching by Whitey Ford, Rip Coleman and Jim Konstanty helped New York Yankees open up a 2½ game lead in the American League Sunday with a pair of 4-0 victories over Chicago White Sox.

The double defeat dropped the White Sox to a third-place tie with idle Boston while Cleveland, rained out at Boston, fell 2½ behind the Yanks.

Baltimore took a doubleheader from Detroit 6-2 and 4-3 dropping the Tigers into the cellar with Gus Triandos and rookie Tito Francona supplying the hitting punch. Kansas City clubbed Washington pitching for a total of 29 hits while winning a pair 10-7 and 13-3.

VANCOUVER (CP) — Rev. Bob Richards, a one-man track and field team from Los Angeles, Saturday swept two firsts, a second and two third placings in the third annual Vancouver relays.

Richards posted a relays record in the pole vaulting, his special event, clearing 14 feet 8 inches. His own previous mark for the relays was 14 feet 6½ inches set in 1953. He made three tries at the 15-foot mark but missed each time by a fraction.

He holds the Canadian open record of 15 feet one inch, set in Toronto in 1952.

Lyle Dickey of the Portland Track and Field Club and Cliff LaBounty of Washington State College tied for second with twin efforts of 13 feet 6 inches.

A superb passer, Revie was used sparingly by Manchester City earlier in the season because of dis-appointing play but appeared to be returning to form in recent weeks.

Nevertheless, it was doubtful he would play until just before the game when, with Billy Spurdie out because of an injury, manager Leslie McDowall put Revie in at centre-forward and switched Bobby Johnston to right wing.

It was a master touch as Revie's deep-lying centre play completely upset and baffled the usually sound Birmingham defence.

# Needles Wins At Kentucky

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Needles threaded his way from next to last place through a charging field of horseflesh Saturday and with a mighty stretch rush captured the \$164,500 Kentucky Derby just like his daddy Ponder did in 1949.

A big favorite of the crowd of some 100,000 at Churchill Downs, the strapping Florida-bred colt brought the first Derby to that palm tree state.

The result was never in doubt midway down the long home stretch, with Needles finally overhauling Calumet Farm's Fabius with less than a sixteenth of a mile remaining in the 1¼-mile race.

Jockey Dave Erb was the "eye" of Needles and his bay charger finished three quarters of a length ahead of Willie Harkack and Fabius.

**PERFECT WEATHER**

Third place, another length and a half behind, went to the surprising Come On Red, who wasn't even supposed to start this 82nd derby unless the track was muddy.

It wasn't, as sunshine and 80-degree weather bathed the premises, and made the track fast although Needles' time was 2:03 2/5, well off Whirlaway's record of 2:01 2/5 in 1941.

This was the second time in the long derby history dating back to 1875 that a son, a daddy and a grandpaw have won this classic for three-year-olds. Ponder's dad, Pensive, a son of English Derby winner Hyperion, won in 1944.

It matched the triple play of Reigh County (1928), his son, Count Fleet (1943) and the Count's son, Count Turf (1951).

This was tremendous victory for two young oilmen, Bonnie Heath of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and Jack Dudley of Stillwater, Okla., along with their trainer, Hugh Fontaine.

**TRIPLE CROWN THREAT**

Needles had been one of the top two-year-olds last year, and ran away with two big winter \$100,000 races in Florida, the Flamingo at Hialeah and the Florida Derby at Gulfstream Park.

The Derby even makes Needles a threat for the two other triple crown classics, the Preakness May 19 at Pimlico in Baltimore and the Belmont at New York June 16. There were plenty of disappointments in the bulky field of 17 starters, as Career Boy and Head Man, the highly regarded horses owned by C.V. Whitney of New York, could do no better than sixth and eighth, respectively.

Another was Rex Ellsworth's Terrang, who led for a part of the early going, then ran out of fuel and finished 12th to spoil the Calumet farm's bid for a second straight Derby triumph. He won last year when Swaps beat Nashua.

Terrang had won this year's Santa Anita Derby, but he couldn't get away with this one.
