from courthouses in the Turkish quarter at 1 p.m. regularly, passing Victoria street where the traffic lights stay red for 30 seconds. He had just finished the morning session at a special court where two 15-year-old Cypriot boys were on trial charged with throwing a bomb in Paphos April 2—a capital offence under emergency regulation. Shaw was asked to head a trio of British judges for the special courts institutes for the special last year as an emergency measure, partly to avoid the risk of Cypriot judges or ordinary courts being intimidated by Cyprus terrorism. He has been a key figure in Cyprus trials for terrorism.

In a ground-floor courtroom with elaborate barred-wire barricades and British sentries, Shaw passed the death sentence on Demetriou, whose execution last month led to riots in Cyprus and Greece. All places of entertainment owned by Greek Cypriots in the city and suburbs were closed until further notice Monday night as punishment for the assassination attempt.

British troops forming a cordon around the city walls opened fire this afternoon when they spotted a Cypriot climbing the walls. At the moment the man's wife ran toward him he was hit in the arm and stomach, and died later in hospital.

In an incident earlier this morning, six masked men armed with shotguns and bombs attacked a police station at Delftera, eight miles south of Nicosia. The attackers fled after wounding one British guard.

Find Bodies Of Drowned Men

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—The bodies of two young Saint John men, who were drowned presumably Sunday afternoon, were found Monday afternoon in Bradley Lake, eight miles from the city.

William W. McMahon, 26, and Ronald D. Bowes, 28, left about 2 p.m. Sunday on a fishing trip, their families said. Their absence from work at a wholesale drug firm touched off a search Monday morning. RCMP who found their car near the lake recovered the bodies by grappling. How the drownings occurred was unknown. McMahon is survived by his widow, the former Dolly Crosby of Bear River, N.S. Surviving Bowes are his widow, formerly Viola Gaudet of Tignish, P.E.I., and three daughters.

N. S. Pharmacists Hold Annual Meeting Here

The 82nd annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Pharmaceutical Society held its first session yesterday morning at the Charlottetown Hotel, with the president Gerald R. Buckley in the chair.

Royal Welcome For Shah Of Iran In Soviet Union

By JOHN RETTIE, MOSCOW (Reuters)—The Shah of Iran and Queen Soraya arrived Monday for a three-week visit and received the nearest royal welcome in Moscow. The ceremony at Moscow Central airport was marked by the greatest pomp yet seen for the arrival of a foreign guest. The Shah is the first reigning monarch to come to the Soviet Union since the visit of King Amanullah Khan of Afghanistan in 1928. The first surprise came when the Soviet airliner carrying the Shah appeared over the airport at 5:45 p.m. Moscow time, escorted by 12 MIG-17 jet fighters. No foreign visitor ever before has had a fighter jet escort on arrival here. Mrs. Voroshilov, who has previously been seen at a greeting ceremony only when President Tito of Yugoslavia arrived here earlier this month, was at the airport with President Klement Voroshilov. NO TEXT KOR SHAH Prime Minister Nikolai Bulganin, Anastas Mikoyan and Mikhail Perukhin, first deputy premier, Marshal Georgy Zhukov, defence minister, and other Soviet officials also were present to greet the Shah and his queen. Wearing a blue air force uniform loaded with gold braid and decorations, the handsome Shah stepped from the Russian Ilyushin-14 airliner followed by the queen, radiant in a rose-pink silk suit flecked with red. Voroshilov in a brief speech read before the microphones and thanked the Shah and his queen. "Your Majesty the Shah-in-Shah of Persia" and "Your Majesty the Queen." "Your visit will give you an opportunity to see that our people sincerely desire friendly, good neighborly relations with Persia." The Shah, speaking without a text, returned Voroshilov's greetings and said: "We agree that personal contacts between the leaders of neighboring states have great importance." TO STAY IN KREMLIN After the speeches the Shah was shown into an open Soviet car, flying the Soviet and Iranian flags. Voroshilov sat next to him and the car, preceded by a motorcycle escort of eight, drove off to the Kremlin. A second car carried Queen Soraya and Mrs. Voroshilov. Thousands cheered the cavalcade. Vast crowds lined the road and groups leaned out of windows on the route to the Kremlin, where the Shah and his queen are staying in a special 20-room suite. It is believed to be the first time the Kremlin has been used to accommodate foreign visitors since the Russian revolution in 1917. The visit is the culmination of persistent efforts by the new Soviet rulers during the last year to improve relations with Iran. Diplomatic observers believe that in this Russia's chief interest is to try to persuade Iran to leave the Baghdad Middle East defence pact and take a neutral stand.
